#### RECOMMENDATION

#### Alternate Resolution 1

That Murray River Council (Council) maintain the previous resolution adopted by Council at its ordinary meeting on the 3<sup>rd</sup> of April 2024 and not make any reimbursements to the Moama Lions Community Village Committee of Management (Committee) in relation to the borrowing and return of loan funds for the construction of additional units.

#### Alternate Resolution 2

That notwithstanding the resolution adopted at its ordinary meeting on the 3rd of April 2024, Murray River Council (Council) resolve to reimburse a sum of \$25,177.44 to the Moama Lions Community Village Committee of Management (Committee), being the additional capital amounts repaid by the Committee.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The Moama Lions Community Village Committee of Management ('the Committee') is a Committee of Council established under Section 355 of the Local Government Act 1998. Functions of the committee include but are not limited to the collection of revenue from tenants which should be used to offset outgoing expenses such as rates. The funds managed by the Section 355 Committee are funds of Council.

At its October meeting in 2020, Council resolved (Resolution 111020): to agree to borrow \$500,000 (from National Australia Bank) to construct six retirement units at 10 & 12 Council Street Moama on land already acquired for the purpose. The Committee was to make repayments on this loan using rental income from the existing units.

At a Special Meeting held on Monday 3 July 2023, the Moama Lions Community Village Committee of Management unanimously agreed that the loan for the construction of new units at 10 & 12 Council Street Moama be returned to Council as the Committee determined that the project was no longer viable due to construction cost escalations.

Some of the funds obtained through the loan had been spent on design and development of plans.

On 26 September 2023 Council resolved to accommodate the request made by the Moama Lions Community Village Committee of Management to return the monies advanced by Council for the construction of additional housing units at 10 & 12 Council Street Moama. The loan from NAB was repaid.

In early 2024, the Committee claimed that they had made repayments over and above the amounts spent on design and development. They requested the return of \$58,558.62 back to their Committee bank account.

At its meeting on 23 April 2024, Council resolved (agenda item 9.5.1) not to make any further reimbursements to the Committee. The Council report submitted to the meeting of 23 April 2024

appears as Attachment 1. The letter requesting the reimbursement from the Committee appears as Attachment 2.

#### DISCUSSION

With the election of a new Council in late 2024, The Committee has prosecuted their case for the refund of the amounts that is claimed to have been overpaid by the Committee to Council. A summary of the amounts borrowed from the bank; amounts spend on design and development, and amounts repaid by the Committee is provided in the table below.

Brandrick Architects were appointed for the design development, planning approval and construction documentation for up to eight new units at 10 & 12 Council Street Moama.

In August 2022 Consent was approved to Brandrick Architects for the construction of eight independent living units for the purposes of seniors housing subject to Deferred Commencement Provisions pertaining to the consolidation of 10 & 12 Council Street November from the War Street Road Reserve closure.

Council officers sought quotes from highly skilled project managers to oversee the project. Only one quote was received, and it was confirmed that the original budget for construction of the new units was unlikely to cover the entire build. Council officers recommended a staged construction plan and obtaining a QS report to establish how many units the available funds would cover.

At a Special Meeting held on Monday 3 July 2023, the Moama Lions Community Village Committee of Management unanimously agreed that the loan for the construction of new units at 10 & 12 Council Street Moama be returned to Council as the Committee determined that the project is not viable at the current time.

The Committee thanked Council for the work done to date preparing documents and plans.

On 26 September 2023 Council resolve to accommodate the request made by the Moama Lions Community Village Committee of Management to return the monies advanced by Council for the construction of additional housing units at 10 & 12 Council Street Moama.

#### RECOMMENDATION

#### That:

- 1. Council adopts the Rates, Charges & General Debtors Write-Off Authority Policy V#1 and the Policy Register be updated; and
- 2. All previous versions of the policy are rescinded.

#### **DISCUSSION**

At the ordinary Council meeting held on the 22<sup>nd</sup> July 2025, the DRAFT Rates, Charges & General Debtors Write-Off Authority Policy V#1 was adopted and placed on public display.

Council levies Rates and Charges annually on properties within the Council area, in keeping with the Revenue Policy which is adopted by Council each year and in keeping with the various relevant clauses in the Local Government Act 1993 (the Act) and the Local Government (General) Regulation 2021 (the Regulation).

Council also incurs debts in relation to other services it provides ratepayers, residents and other business entities.

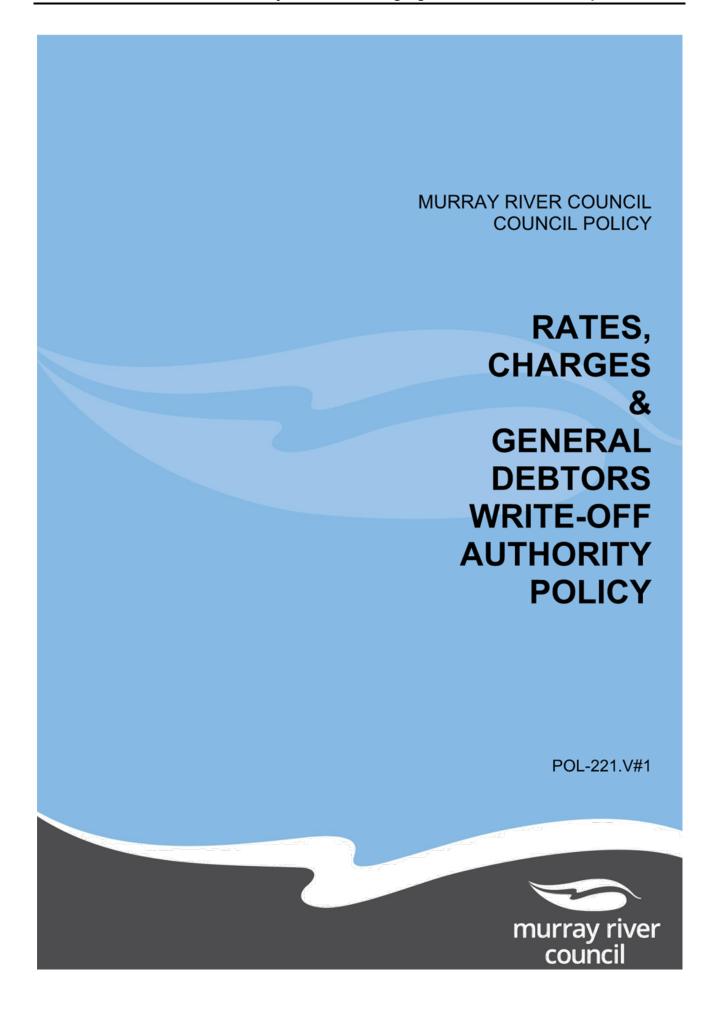
In some instances, it is necessary and in the best interest of Council, to write-off of debts. The usual process for approval of such Write-Offs of Debt is to obtain a resolution of Council. However, such a procedure is not efficient or cost effective under certain circumstances and where the amount involved is not significant. #### 1. INTRODUCTION

Council levies Rates and Charges annually on properties within the Council area, in keeping with the Revenue Policy which is adopted by Council each year and in keeping with the various relevant clauses in the Local Government Act 1993 (the Act) and the Local Government (General) Regulation 2021 (the Regulation).

Council also incurs debts in relation to other services it provides ratepayers, residents and other business entities.

In some instances, it is necessary and in the best interest of Council, to write-off of debts. The usual process for approval of such Write-Offs of Debt is to obtain a resolution of Council. However, such a procedure is not efficient or cost effective under certain circumstances and where the amount involved is not significant. #### 2. OBJECTIVES

- Where the write off would facilitate any debt recovery actions, and/or results in the collections of a much larger amount; and

To ensure proper controls are in place to govern the activity of writing-off debts owed to Council, whether they be debts stemming from the levying of rates & charges or sundry debts stemming from the fees charged for the recover of services provided by Council.

- Any write-off of debts.

5.2. The CEO must maintain a register that record and detail all write-off of debts that have been made in keeping with the delegated authority provided in this Policy.

  - the first Council meeting after the completion of the first half of the financial year, and
  - the first Council meeting after the completion of the financial year.

The report to contain details as specified in Section 213(4) of the Regulation.

5.4. The CEO to implement an internal process, where the requests for write-off of debt are made by Council Officers in writing (or through an auditable electronic system), to the CEO and where appropriate contain interim approvals (by a Manager or a Director).

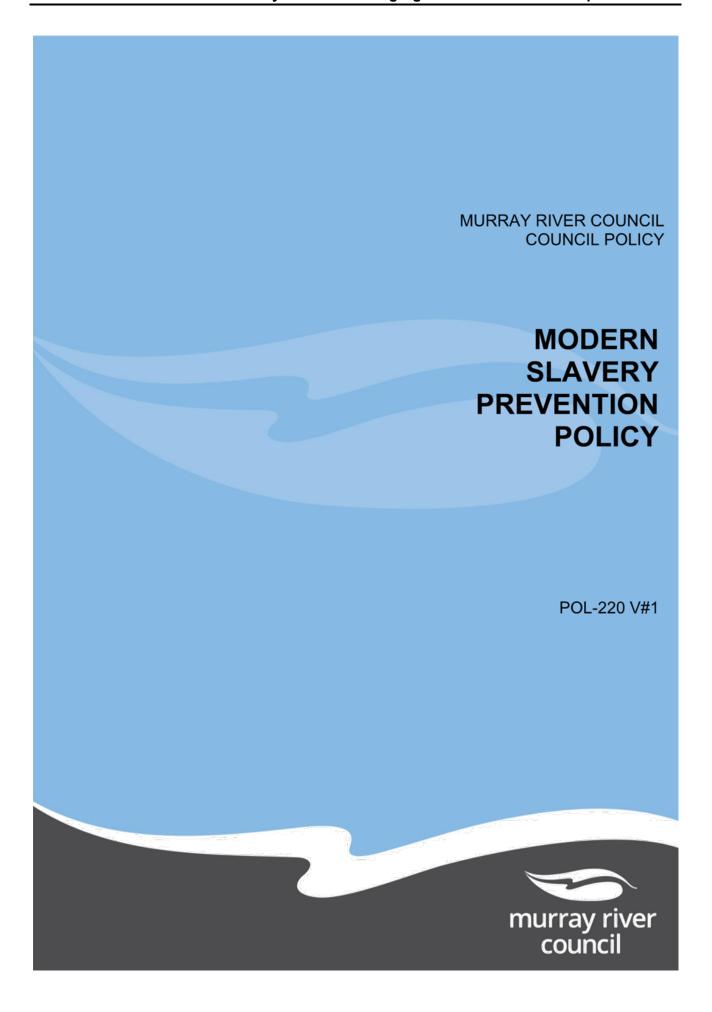

#### 1. INTRODUCTION

The Modern Slavery Act 2018 (NSW) (hereafter as the MS Act) introduced a number of obligations for local councils under the Local Government Act 1993 (NSW) to meet, including a requirement to take reasonable steps to ensure goods and services procured on behalf of councils are not the product of Modern Slavery and to report on the steps taken in managing modern slavery risks.

This Policy outlines Council's strategic approach to identifying, assessing, managing and mitigating the risk of Modern Slavery within its operations and supply chains in accordance with Council's ethical obligations and statutory responsibilities as set out in the MS Act and the Anti-Slavery Commissioner's Guidance on Reasonable Steps ('GRS').

#### 2. POLICY OBJECTIVES

The objectives of this Policy are to:

- Outline Council's strategic commitment to ensuring goods and services we procure are not the product of Modern Slavery;

#### SCOPE

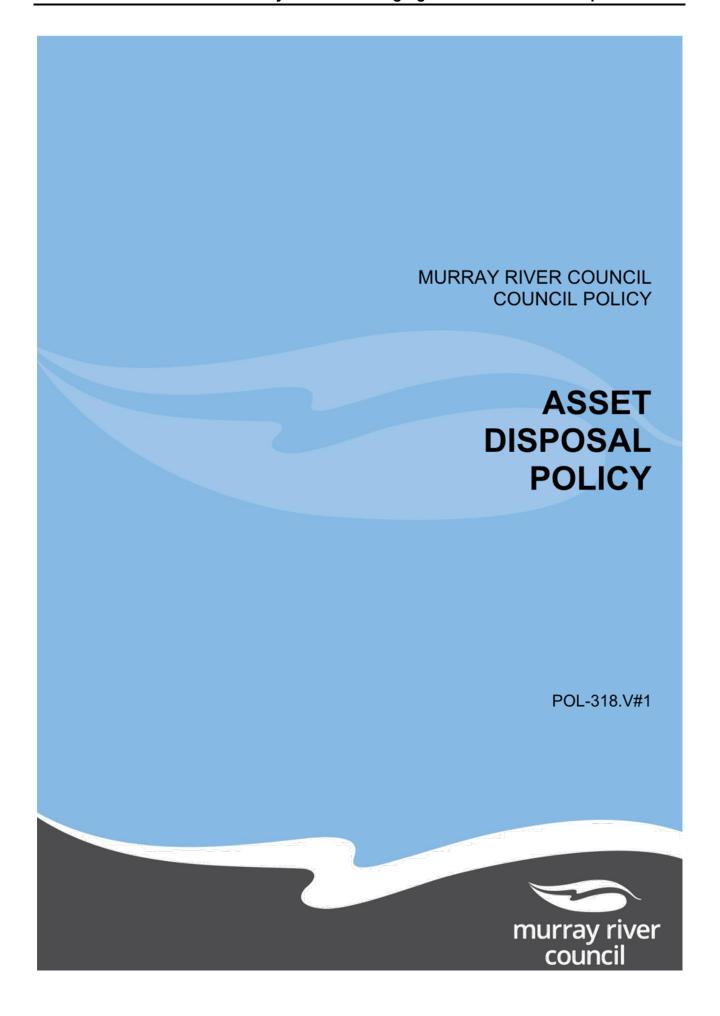

#### 1. INTRODUCTION

With an asset base of over one billion dollars, Council decommissions and/or ceases to use assets on a regular basis. Such assets need to be disposed of, either sold for a monetary return to Council, donated free of charge to identified parties or responsibly disposed of for recycling or to a landfill.

#### 2. OBJECTIVES

The objectives of the Policy are to ensure that asset disposals undertaken by Council are done:

- In a socially responsible manner; and
- To obtain the best value for Council; and
- Through a transparent process.

#### SCOPE

This Policy applies to:

- The disposal of all Council owned assets, excluding land/building assets.
- · All Council Officers undertaking such disposals.

The disposal of land assets is governed by the Land Acquisition and Disposal Policy.

#### 5.1. PRINCIPLES

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#### 5.2. METHODOLOGY

Council will adopt the following methodology in disposing of assets.

- Where an organised and structured marketplace exists for a particular type of used asset, then Council will make use of such marketplaces to maintain transparency and to obtain the best monetary return. (An example of such a marketplace would be an online marketplace for the sale of used cars).
  - Council will review the use of such markets on a regular basis to ensure fair, open and competitive disposal of assets:
- Where no organised marketplace exists for the assets being disposed, in the first instance Council will explore the possibility of advertising the assets directly, using any means that are deemed to be best suited to obtain the optimum return to Council. Such action to be undertaken only where the expected proceeds of the sale exceed the costs and effort to undertake the advertising and sale process.

#### Where:

- The cost of any sale is likely to exceed the cost of undertaking a sale, or
- An advertising process has been undertaken, and the asset(s) remain unsold, or
- The items can be classified as having a minor value,

the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) may determine that such assets may be sold through an offer to employees of Council. Where such an approach is undertaken, the CEO shall ensure a transparent process where every employee has an equal opportunity to purchase any of the items on offer.

- Where assets remain unsold even after an offer to employees, Council shall explore opportunities for the donation of such items to local charities. The CEO shall determine the charities to which such assets are offered. When such donations are made, the CEO shall make best efforts to ensure that charities to which such offers are made, are rotated to cover as many charities as possible. Priority shall be given to charities within the Council area.
- Where assets cannot be disposed of in a manner that facilitates reuse, Council shall make best efforts to recycle the assets or any of its component materials (e.g. disposing to e-waste sites)
- Where recycling is not possible, Council may dispose assets or components to a landfill, ensuring that any remediation measures required, depending on the asset or material, is undertaken in keeping with legislative and regulatory requirements. (e.g. disposal of asbestos containing materials)

#### 5.3. OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

Where assets that has contained Council data are being disposed, Council shall ensure that such data is permanently deleted from such assets. (e.g. laptops) Where there is a risk that such data can be recovered, devices containing such data shall be removed and destroyed, prior to disposal of the asset.

#### **INCOME & EXPENDITURE**

For the period under review, Council's operating surplus stood at \$22.3M after charging depreciation (What We Set-aside for Asset Renewals) of \$3.6M.

Net earnings are \$23.7M when Capital Revenue and Capital Expenses are added to the operating surplus.

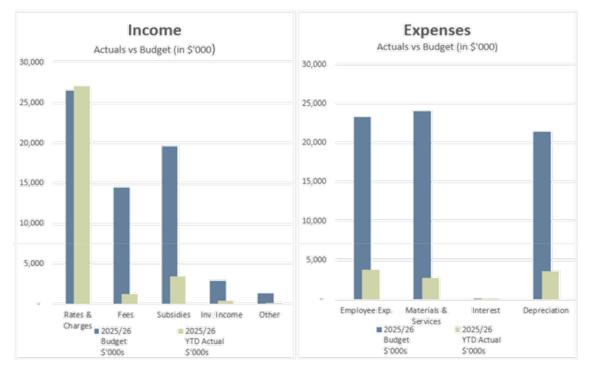
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#### Income & Expenditure

- We received 50% of the Financial Assistance Grant (being the primary source of operational grant revenue) in late June 2025 (last financial year) and have received the 1<sup>st</sup> quarterly instalment in August 2025. Currently the actual v budget are on target. We are expecting to receive the remaining funding allocation in instalments over this financial year (Nov25, Feb26 & May26).
- "What We Invoiced our Customers" is less than expected based on the annual budget amount.
   Majority of the revenue within this category is invoiced monthly, however Water Notices are
   issued every 4 months. We have not issued Water Notices for this financial year and are next
   expected to be issued in November 2025.
- Due to the reduction in the amount of Financial Assistance Grant funding received up front, we
  have limited the amount invested to manage cash flow, as well as a reduction in interest rates,
  our actual v budget for "What we Received as Interest from Investments" is slightly lower than
  expected.
- · All of the other revenue items have tracked on target or above.
- Expenses paid to our Suppliers are slightly lower than expected. At the end of August, the YTD % is sitting at 11% and is expected to be 17%.
- Our employee expenses (What we paid our Employees) are tracking as expected.

- The increase of approx. \$4.1M between Budget and Actual for What We Owe our Lenders
  predominately relates to Contract Liabilities not being budgeted for. Contract Liabilities relate to
  Grant revenue received yet not able to be recognised as revenue until corresponding works to
  which the Grant revenue relates is completed.
- Cash balances (what we have in the bank) are higher than budgeted, this is due to timing as the
  budgeted amount is for the full year. We have received approx. 62% of the Federal Assistance
  Grant to date, however only had expenditure for 2 months. We expect the cash balance to align
  with budget as we expend of the year. The cash balances remain at satisfactory levels, noting
  that a sizeable portion of the investments are restricted for specific purposes. (see investments
  report).
- What we are owed is at expected levels as Council have issued their annual rates and charges
  notices in July with only the first instalment required (as a minimum) to be paid in August. This
  will decrease over the financial year as instalment notices are pay by the due dates.

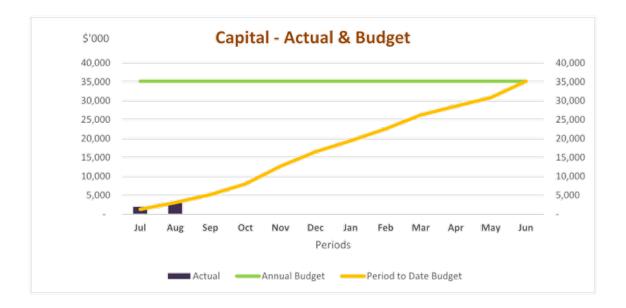


#### CAPITAL DELIVERY

Council's approved budgeted capital allocation is \$34.66M for 2025/26 after approval of the original budget. As at 31 August 2025, Council has spent approx. \$2.9M on its capital program, which is 8% of the annual capital budget excluding commitments for 2025/26, including commitments 16% of the annual capital budget has been expended & committed.

Based on the estimated timing of projects in the capital program, as at 31 August 2025 Council was estimated to have delivered \$3.0M of the capital budget, with current year to date actual expenditure of \$2.9M Council has delivered 96% of its capital budget program.

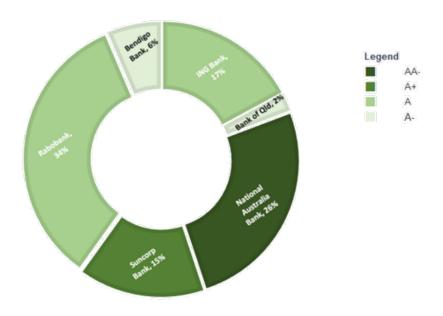

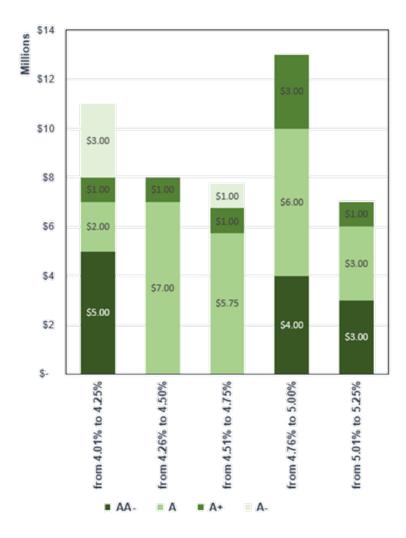

The portfolio is well invested in reasonable interest rates, and the maturity profile varies according to planned cash flow of the Council. The objective is to optimize the cash flow needs and maximize the return on investments while ensuring compliance with the Local Government regulations and Council's Investment Policy. At present short-term rates are a lot higher than long term rates.

The current position is to only invest in ADI's that are rated A- or better as per S&P's long term credit ratings, even though the Investment Policy permits some investments in ADIs with lower ratings.

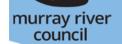
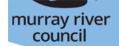

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#### 1. INTRODUCTION

This Policy enables the reasonable and appropriate reimbursement of expenses and provision of facilities to Councillors to help them undertake their civic duties.

It ensures accountability and transparency and seeks to align Councillor expenses and facilities with community expectations. Councillors must not obtain private or political benefit from any expense or facility provided under this Policy.

#### PURPOSE

The objectives of this Policy are to:

#### 3. SCOPE

#### 5. POLICY STATEMENT

The provision of expenses and facilities enables Councillors to fulfil their civic duties as the elected representative of Murray River Council.

The community is entitled to know the extent of expenses paid to Councillors, as well as the facilities provided.

The purpose of this Policy is to clearly state the facilities and support that are available to Councillors to assist them in fulfilling their civic duties.

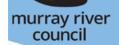
Council Officers are empowered to question or refuse a request for payment from a Councillor when it is not in accordance with this Policy.

Expenses and facilities provided by this Policy are in addition to the monthly fees and superannuation paid to Councillors.

Councillor's fees are adopted annually by resolution of Council, they are determined by applying the <u>Local Government Remuneration Tribunal - Annual Report and Determination</u> and in accordance with Section 241 of the Act.

The Policy sets out the maximum amounts Murray River Council (the 'Council') will pay for specific expenses and facilities. Expenses not explicitly addressed in this Policy will not be paid or reimbursed.

Detailed reports on the provision of expenses and facilities to Councillors will be publicly tabled at a Council meeting every six (6) months and published in full on Council's website. These reports will include expenditure summarised by individual Councillor and as a total for all Councillors.

#### PRINCIPLES

Council commits to the following principles:

Proper conduct:	Councillors and staff acting lawfully and honestly, exercising care and diligence in carrying out their functions.
Reasonable expenses:	Providing for Councillors to be reimbursed for expenses reasonably incurred as part of their role as Councillor.
Participation and access:	Enabling people from diverse backgrounds, underrepresented groups, those in carer roles and those with special needs to serve as a Councillor.
Equity:	There must be equitable access to expenses and facilities for all Councillors.
Appropriate use of resources:	Providing clear direction on the appropriate use of Council resources in accordance with legal requirements and community expectations.
Accountability and transparency:	Clearly stating and reporting on the expenses and facilities provided to Councillors

#### 7. PRIVATE AND POLITICAL BENEFIT

Councillors must not obtain private or political benefit from any expense or facility provided under this Policy, ie Council equipment or facilities cannot be used to provide a political benefit.

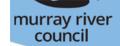
Incidental and irregular use of Council equipment and facilities may occur from time to time. Council will not be required to be repaid for such incidental use.

Councillors should avoid obtaining any greater private benefit from Council than an incidental benefit. Where there are unavoidable circumstances and more substantial private use of Council facilities does occur, Councillors must reimburse Council.

Campaigns for re-election are considered to be a political benefit. The following are examples of what is considered to be a political interest during a re-election campaign:

- production of election material;
- use of Council resources and equipment for campaigning;
- use of official Council letterhead, publications, websites or services for political benefit; and
- fundraising activities of political parties or individuals, including political fundraising events.

#### PART A: EXPENSES

All expenses provided under this Policy will be for a purpose specific to the functions of holding civic office. Allowances for general expenses are not permitted under this Policy.

Expenses not explicitly addressed in this Policy will not be paid or reimbursed.

#### 8. SPECIFIC EXPENSES

#### 8.1 GENERAL TRAVEL ARRANGEMENTS AND EXPENSES

All travel by Councillors should be undertaken using the most direct route and the most practicable and economical mode of transport.

Each Councillor may be reimbursed up to a total of \$10,000 per year and the Mayor may be reimbursed an additional amount of up \$2,500 per year, for travel expenses incurred while undertaking official business, professional development or attending approved conferences and seminars within NSW.

This includes reimbursement:

- For public transport fares;
- For the use of a private vehicle or hire car;
- For parking costs for Council and other meetings;
- For tolls;
- By Cab Charge card or equivalent; and
- For documented ride-share programs, such as Uber, where tax invoices can be issued.

Allowances for the use of a private vehicle will be reimbursed by kilometre at the rate contained in the current version of the Local Government (State) Award.

Councillors seeking to be reimbursed for use of a private vehicle must keep a log-book recording the date, distance and purpose of travel being claimed. Copies of the relevant log-book contents must be provided with the claim.

Councillors may also access a Council pool vehicle when undertaking Council business. However, this is dependent on availability and other conditions of use.

#### 8.2 INTERSTATE, OVERSEAS AND LONG DISTANCE INTRASTATE TRAVEL EXPENSES

Given Council's location on an interstate border, travel to Victoria will be considered as general travel. Arrangements and expenses for this travel will be governed by Clause 8.1 above.

In accordance with Section 7 of this Policy, Council will scrutinise the value and need for Councillors to undertake overseas travel. Councils should avoid interstate, overseas and long-distance intrastate trips unless direct and tangible benefits can be established for the Council and the local community. This includes travel to sister and friendship cities.

Total interstate, overseas and long-distance intrastate travel expenses for all Councillors will be capped at a maximum of \$25,000 per year. This amount will be set aside in Council's annual budget.

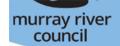
Councillors seeking approval for any interstate and long-distance intrastate travel must submit a case to, and obtain the approval of, the Council and/or CEO prior to travel.

Councillors seeking approval for any overseas travel must submit a case to, and obtain the approval of, a full Council meeting prior to travel.

The case should include:

Objectives to be achieved in travel, including an explanation of how the travel aligns with current Council
priorities and business, the community benefits which will accrue as a result and its relevance to the

exercise of the Councillor's civic duties;

- Who is to take part in the travel;
- Duration and itinerary of travel; and
- A detailed budget including a statement of any amounts expected to be reimbursed by the participant/s.

For interstate and long-distance intrastate journeys by air, the class of air travel is to be economy.

If a Councillor wishes to upgrade the class of air travel, it will be at the Councillor's personal expense.

For international travel, the class of air travel is to be premium economy, if available. Otherwise, the class of travel is to be economy.

Bookings for approved air travel are to be made through the CEO's office and through Council's corporate account.

Councillors should not benefit from any frequent flyer program linked to airlines when air travel is booked privately and reimbursed by Council. Wherever possible, any accrued points should be transferred back to Council.

#### 8.3 TRAVEL EXPENSES NOT PAID BY COUNCIL

Council will not pay any traffic or parking fines or administrative charges for road toll accounts received when travelling on Council business.

Councillors may seek special consideration in exceptional circumstances and considered on a case-bycase basis.

#### 8.4 ACCOMMODATION AND MEALS

In circumstances where it would introduce undue risk for a Councillor to travel to or from official business in the late evening or early morning, reimbursement of costs for accommodation and meals on the night before or after the meeting may be approved by the CEO. This includes where travel from home would involve travel before 7:00 am or travel to home would involve travel after 6:00 pm and the Councillor lives more than 50 kilometres from the meeting location.

Council will reimburse costs for accommodation and meals while Councillors are undertaking prior approved travel or professional development more than 200 kilometres outside the Murray River Council geographic area.

The daily limits for accommodation and meal expenses within Australia are to be consistent with those set out in Part B Monetary Rates of the <u>NSW Crown Employees (Public Service Conditions of Employment)</u> Reviewed Award 2009 – Items 1,2 and 3, as adjusted annually.

The daily limits for accommodation and meal expenses outside Australia are to be determined in advance by the CEO and approved by the Council.

Councillors will not be reimbursed for alcoholic beverages.

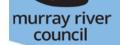
#### 8.5 REFRESHMENTS FOR COUNCIL RELATED MEETINGS

Appropriate refreshments will be available for Council meetings, Council committee meetings, Councillor briefings, approved meetings and engagements and official Council functions, as approved by the CEO.

#### 8.6 PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Council will set aside \$5,000 per Councillor annually in its budget to facilitate professional development of Councillors through programs, training, education courses and membership of professional bodies.

In the first year of a new Council term, Council will provide a comprehensive induction program for all Councillors which considers any guidelines issued by the Office of Local Government (OLG). The cost of the induction program will be in addition to the ongoing professional development funding.

Annual membership of professional bodies will only be covered where the membership is relevant to the exercise of the Councillor's civic duties, the Councillor actively participates in the body and the cost of membership is likely to be fully offset by savings from attending events as a member.

Approval for professional development activities is subject to a prior written request to the CEO outlining the:

- Details of the proposed professional development;
- Relevance to Council priorities and business; and
- Relevance of the exercise of the Councillor's civic duties.

In assessing a Councillor request for a professional development activity, the CEO must consider the factors set out above, as well as the cost of the professional development in relation to the Councillor's remaining budget.

#### 8.7 CONFERENCES AND SEMINARS

Council is committed to ensuring its Councillors are up to date with contemporary issues facing Council and the community and local government in NSW.

Council will set aside a total amount of \$20,000 annually in its budget to facilitate Councillor attendance at conferences and seminars, including the Local Government NSW Annual Conference. This allocation is for all Councillors. The CEO will ensure that access to expenses relating to conferences and seminars is distributed equitably.

Approval to attend a conference or seminar is subject to either a Council resolution or written request to the CEO. In assessing a Councillor request, the CEO must consider factors including the:

- Relevance of the topics and presenters to current Council priorities or business and the exercise of the Councillor's civic duties; and
- Cost of the conference or seminar in relation to the total remaining budget.

Council will meet the reasonable cost of registration fees, transportation and accommodation associated with attendance at conferences approved by the CEO. Council will also meet the reasonable cost of meals when they are not included in the conference fees.

Reimbursement for accommodation and meals not included in the conference fees will be subject to Clauses 8.4.

#### 8.8 INFORMATION AND COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGY (ICT) EXPENSES

Council will provide Councillors with appropriate ICT devices as per the monetary limits as set out in Section 5 – Policy Statement, for each Councillor and each term of Council.

In addition, Councillors may claim up to \$25 (inclusive of GST) per month to offset their mobile phone and internet expenses. Supporting documentation will not be required.

The amount claimed should be included on the Councillor's monthly expenses claim form.

#### 8.9 SPECIAL REQUIREMENT AND CARER EXPENSES

Council encourages wide participation and interest in civic office. It will seek to ensure Council premises and associated facilities are accessible, including provision for sight and hearing-impaired Councillors and those with other disabilities.

Transport cost provisions as outlined in Section 5 – Policy Statement of this Policy will also assist Councillors who may be unable to drive a vehicle.

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In addition, to the provisions above, the CEO may authorise the provision of reasonable additional facilities and expenses in order to allow a Councillor with a disability to perform their civic duties.

Councillors who are the principal carer of a child or other elderly, disabled and/or sick immediate family member will be entitled to reimbursement of carer's expenses up to a maximum of \$1,000 per annum for attendance at official business.

Childcare expenses may be claimed for children up to and including the age of 16 years where the carer is not a relative.

In the event of caring for an adult person, Councillors will need to provide suitable evidence to the CEO that reimbursement is applicable. This may take the form of advice from a medical practitioner.

#### 8.10 HOME OFFICE EXPENSES

Each Councillor may be reimbursed up to \$500 per year for costs associated with the maintenance of a home office, such as minor items of consumable stationery and printer ink cartridges.

#### 9. INSURANCES

In accordance with Section 382 of the Act, Council is insured against public liability and professional indemnity claims. Councillors will be provided insurance cover under Council's Councillors and Officers Liability and Personal Accident insurance policies.

Insurance protection is only provided if a claim arises out of or in connection with the Councillor's performance of his or her civic duties or exercise of his or her functions as a Councillor. All insurances are subject to any limitations or conditions set out in the policies of insurance.

Council shall pay the insurance policy excess in respect of any claim accepted by Council's insurers, whether defended or not.

Appropriate travel insurances will be provided for any Councillors travelling on approved interstate and overseas travel on Council business.

If a Councillor, whilst performing his or her civic duties, has an accident in their own vehicle, Council will reimburse the Councillor the amount of the Councillor's insurance policy excess that they were required to pay

However, Council reserves the right to decline reimbursement if the Councillor was in breach of the road rules at the time of the accident.

#### 10. LEGAL ASSISTANCE

Council may, if requested, indemnify or reimburse the reasonable legal expenses of a Councillor:

- Defending an action arising from the performance in good faith of a function under the Act, provided that the outcome of the legal proceedings is favourable to the Councillor;
- Defending an action in defamation, provided the statements complained of were made in good faith in the course of exercising a function under the Act and the outcome of the legal proceedings is favourable to the Councillor; and
- For proceedings before an appropriate investigative or review body, provided the subject of the proceedings arises from the performance in good faith of a function under the Act and the matter has proceeded past any initial assessment phase to a formal investigation or review and the investigative or review body makes a finding substantially favourable to the Councillor.

In the case of a Code of Conduct complaint made against a Councillor, legal costs will only be made available where the matter has been referred by the CEO/Code of Conduct Coordinator to a conduct reviewer and the conduct reviewer has commenced a formal investigation of the matter and makes a finding substantially in favour of the Councillor.

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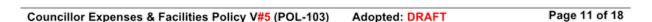


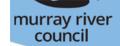
Legal expenses incurred in relation to proceedings arising out of the performance by a Councillor of his or her functions under the Act are distinguished from expenses incurred in relation to proceedings arising merely from something that a Councillor has done during his or her term in office. For example, expenses arising from an investigation as to whether a Councillor acted corruptly would not be covered by this section.

Council will not meet the legal costs:

- Of legal proceedings initiated by a Councillor under any circumstances; or
- Of a Councillor seeking advice in respect of possible defamation, or in seeking a non-litigious remedy for possible defamation; or
- For legal proceedings that do not involve a Councillor performing their role as a Councillor.

Reimbursement of expenses for reasonable legal expenses must have Council approval by way of a resolution at a Council meeting prior to costs being incurred.





#### PART B: FACILITIES

#### 11. GENERAL FACILITIES FOR ALL COUNCILLORS

Council will provide the following facilities to Councillors to assist them to effectively discharge their civic duties and they will be of a standard deemed by the CEO as appropriate for the purpose.

#### 11.1 STATIONERY

Council will provide the following stationery to Councillors each year:

- Business cards;
- A name badge which may be worn at official functions, indicating that the wearer holds the office of a Councillor and/or Mayor or Deputy Mayor;
- Minor stationery items upon request; and
- Access to local newspaper subscriptions upon request.

Councillors can submit for reimbursement the purchase of other stationery items that are deemed appropriate by the CEO.

#### 11.2 UNIFORMS

Council will provide uniforms to Councillors in line with Council's adopted Uniform Colour and Style Palette for indoor staff, to the maximum value of \$200 per Councillor per year.

However, newly elected Councillors will be allocated a maximum of \$600 for their first year of office.

All uniforms purchased, using Council funds, must have the logo applied and must be returned to Council on the Councillor ceasing to hold office.

Council will also provide Councillor's will a hi-vis vest and other appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE) when attending a Council initiated site visit.

#### 11.3 MEETING ROOMS

Councillors may book meeting rooms for official business in a specified Council building at no cost. Rooms may be booked through the CEO's Office.

#### 11.4 ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT

Council will provide administrative support to all Councillors to assist them with their civic duties only. Administrative support may be provided by a member of Council's administrative staff, as arranged by the CEO or their delegate.

Council employees are expected to assist Councillors with civic duties only and not assist with matters of personal or political interest, including campaigning.

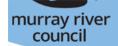
#### 12. ADDITIONAL FACILITIES FOR THE MAYOR

#### 12.1 MAYORAL VEHICLE

Council will provide to the Mayor a fully maintained vehicle to a similar standard of other Council vehicles, with a fuel card. The vehicle will be supplied for use on Council business, professional development and attendance at the Council's offices.

The Mayor must keep a log-book setting out the date, distance and purpose of all travel. This must include any travel for private benefit. The log-book must be submitted to Council on a monthly basis.

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The Mayoral Allowance will be reduced to cover the cost of any private travel recorded in the log-book, calculated on a per kilometre basis by the rate set by the Local Government (State) Award.

The acceptance/use of a mayoral vehicle is at the discretion of the elected Mayor.

#### 12.2 MAYORAL OFFICE

Council will provide the Mayor with a furnished office incorporating a computer configured to Council's standard operating environment, telephone and meeting space.

#### 12.3 CORPORATE CREDIT CARD

Council will provide the Mayor with a Corporate Credit Card for use on Council business only.

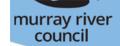
No cash withdrawals can be made.

The Mayor must provide details and receipts for all entries on the Card and abide by all the conditions of use as set out in Council's Corporate Credit Card Policy.

#### 12.4 MOBILE PHONE

Council will provide the Mayor with a mobile telephone device. Reasonable private use is permitted and will not be subject to a compensatory payment.

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#### PART C: PROCESSES

#### 13. APPROVAL, PAYMENT AND REIMBURSEMENT ARRANGEMENTS

Expenses should only be incurred by Councillors in accordance with the provisions of this Policy.

Approval for incurring expenses, or for the reimbursement of such expenses, should be obtained before the expense is incurred.

Up to the maximum limits specified in this Policy, approval for the following may be sought after the expense is incurred:

- Local travel relating to the conduct of official business
- Carer costs
- ICT expenditure.

Final approval for payments made under this Policy will be granted by the CEO or their delegate.

Payment of Councillor's fees will be paid monthly in arrears and are scheduled for payment in Council's first payment run of each month.

Superannuation payments will be paid quarterly.

#### 13.1 DIRECT PAYMENT

Council may approve and directly pay expenses. Requests for direct payment must be submitted to the Director Corporate Services for assessment against this Policy using the prescribed form, with sufficient information and time to allow for the claim to be assessed and processed.

#### 13.2 REIMBURSEMENT

All claims for reimbursement of expenses incurred must be made on the prescribed form, supported by appropriate receipts and/or tax invoices and be submitted to the Director Corporate Services.

#### 13.3 ADVANCE PAYMENT

Council may pay a cash advance for Councillors attending approved conferences, seminars or professional development and can be made on request to the CEO.

The maximum value of a cash advance is \$100 per day to a maximum of \$500 in total.

Requests for advance payment must be made in writing and submitted to the CEO for assessment against this Policy, with sufficient information and time to allow for the claim to be assessed and processed.

Councillors must fully reconcile all expenses against the cost of the advance within one month of incurring the cost and/or returning home. This includes providing to Council:

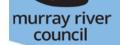
- A full reconciliation of all expenses including appropriate receipts and/or tax invoices
- Reimbursement of any amount of the advance payment not spent in attending to official business or professional development.

#### 13.4 NOTIFICATION

If a claim is approved, Council will make payment directly or reimburse the Councillor through accounts payable.

If a claim is refused, Council will inform the Councillor in writing that the claim has been refused and the reason for the refusal.

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#### 13.5 REIMBURSEMENT TO COUNCIL

If Council has incurred an expense on behalf of a Councillor that exceeds a maximum limit, exceeds reasonable incidental private use or is not provided for in this Policy:

- Council will invoice the Councillor for the expense; and
- the Councillor will reimburse Council for that expense within fourteen (14) days of the invoice date.

If the Councillor cannot reimburse Council within fourteen (14) days of the invoice date, they are to submit a written explanation to the CEO. The CEO may elect to deduct the amount from the Councillor's allowance.

#### 13.6 TIMEFRAME FOR REIMBURSEMENT

Unless otherwise specified in this Policy, Councillors must provide all claims for reimbursement within three (3) months of an expense being incurred. Claims made after this time will not be approved.

Councillor reimbursements will be paid in a timely manner following receipt of the claim.

#### 14. DISPUTES

If a Councillor disputes a determination under this Policy, the Councillor should discuss the matter with the CEO.

If the Councillor and the CEO cannot resolve the dispute, the Councillor may submit a notice of motion to a Council meeting seeking to have the dispute resolved.

#### 15. RETURN OR RETENTION OF FACILITIES

All stationery, uniforms and/or equipment supplied under this Policy are to be relinquished immediately upon a Councillor or Mayor ceasing to hold office or at the cessation of their civic duties.

Should a Councillor desire to keep any equipment allocated by Council, then this Policy enables the Councillor to make application to the CEO to purchase any such equipment. The CEO will determine whether such equipment can be purchased, an agreed fair market price or written down value for the item of equipment. It is anticipated that at the end of the term of the Council, the depreciated value will be zero.

The prices for all equipment purchased by Councillors will be recorded in Council's Annual Report.

#### 16. REPORTING

Council will report on the provision of expenses and facilities to Councillors, as required in the Act and Regulations.

Detailed reports on the provision of expenses and facilities to Councillors will be publicly tabled at a Council meeting every six (6) months and published in full on Council's website. These reports will include expenditure summarised by individual Councillor and as a total for all Councillors.

#### 17.AUDITING

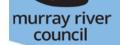
The operation of this Policy, including claims made under the Policy, will be included in council's audit program and an audit undertaken at least every two years.

#### 18. BREACHES

Suspected breaches of this Policy are to be reported to the CEO.

Alleged breaches of this Policy shall be dealt with by following the processes outlined for breaches of the <a href="Code">Code of Conduct Policy</a>, as detailed in <a href="the Code">the Code</a> and in <a href="the Procedures">the Procedures</a> for the Administration of the Code.

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#### 19. EVALUATION AND REVIEW

It is the responsibility of the Chief Executive Officer to monitor the adequacy of this Policy and recommend appropriate changes.

This Policy will be formally reviewed every four (4) years but within the first 12 months of a new term of Council or as needed, whichever comes first.

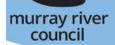

#### RECOMMENDATION

- 1. Council adopts the Public Interest Disclosure (PID) Policy V#4 and the Policy Register be updated; and
- 2. All previous versions of the Policy are rescinded.

#### DISCUSSION

At the ordinary Council meeting held on the 22<sup>nd</sup> July 2025, the DRAFT Public Interest Disclosure (PID) Policy V#4 was adopted and placed on public display.

This Policy enables Council to fulfil its obligations as outlined in the <u>PID Act</u> and any related Acts and Regulations.

It is designed to complement normal communication channels between all levels of Council. However, it is not intended that all issues must be raised as PIDs, rather that an option to do so is clearly available.

Whilst opportunities for reporting outside Council are legal and valid, Council is committed to providing a system for reporting within Council, wherever possible, so that management is given an opportunity to remediate a problem in the first instance.

This Policy is based on the Developing your Public Interest Disclosure Policy, published by the NSW Ombudsman's Office – July 2023. Council will utilise the resources found on the NSW Ombudsman's website as procedural documents.

This Policy will provide you with information on the following:

- Ways you can make a voluntary PID to Council under the PID Act;
- How to contact the nominated Disclosure Officers at Council;
- The roles and responsibilities of Council Officers who hold particular roles under the PID Act;
- What information you will receive once you have made a voluntary PID;
- Protections available to people who make a report of serious wrongdoing under the PID Act and what we will do to protect you;
- Council's Procedures for dealing with disclosures;
- Council's Procedures for managing the risk of detrimental action and reporting detrimental action;
- Council's record-keeping and reporting requirements; and
- How Council will ensure it complies with the PID Act and this Policy.

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MRC, to deal effectively with reports of wrongdoing, is committed to:

- Creating a climate of trust, where people are comfortable and confident about reporting wrongdoing.
- ▶ Encouraging individuals to come forward if they are aware of wrongdoing within Council.
- ▶ Keeping the identity of the person disclosing wrongdoing confidential, where this is possible and appropriate.
- ▶ Protecting the person from any adverse action resulting from them making a report.
- Dealing with reports thoroughly and impartially and if some form of wrongdoing has been found, taking appropriate action to rectify it.
- Keeping the individual who makes a report informed of the progress and the outcome.
- Encouraging the reporting of wrongdoing within Council, but respect any decision to disclose wrongdoing outside Council that is made in accordance with the provisions of <a href="https://example.com/thepselocation-com/th
- ► Ensuring Managers/Supervisors understand the benefits of reporting wrongdoing, are familiar with this Policy and aware of the needs of those who report wrongdoing.
- Providing adequate resources, to:
  - Encourage reports of wrongdoing;
  - Protect and support those who make them;
  - Provide training about how to make reports and the benefits of internal reports to the Council
    and the public interest generally;
  - Properly assess and investigate or otherwise deal with allegations;
  - Properly manage any workplace issues that the allegations identify or that result from a report; and
  - Appropriately address any identified problems.

#### RECOMMENDATION

#### BACKGROUND

The Access to Council Information and Staff by Councillors Policy (as in was then known) was first adopted on the 8 August 2017 and was reviewed and updated again on the 28 November 2023.

This policy is based on the Model Councillor and Staff Interaction Policy 2022 developed by the Department of Planning and Environment.

There have been minimal changes made to the previous Policy, this is mainly due to the fact that the Model Policy has not been amended since this Policy was previously endorsed in 2023. Additional information is shown in GREEN text.

A Schedule, will be developed, with the contact details of Council Officers that Councillors can interact with.

#### **DISCUSSION**

The Councillor and Council Officer Interaction Policy (the Policy) provides a framework for Councillors when exercising their civic functions by specifically addressing their ability to interact with and receive advice from authorised Council Officers.

This Policy provides direction on interactions between Councillors and Council Officers to assist both parties in carrying out their day-to-day duties professionally, ethically and respectfully.

It is important to have an effective working relationship that recognises the important but differing contribution both parties bring to their complementary roles.

The aim of the Policy is to facilitate a positive working relationship between Councillors, as the community's elected representatives and Council Officers, who are employed to administer the operations of Council.

The objectives of the Policy are:

- establish positive, effective and professional working relationships between Councillors and Council Officers defined by mutual respect and courtesy;
- enable Councillors and Council Officers to work together appropriately and effectively to support each other in their respective roles;
- ensure that Councillors receive advice in an orderly, courteous and appropriate manner to assist them in the performance of their civic duties;
- ensure Councillors have adequate access to information to exercise their statutory roles;
- provide direction on, and guide Councillor interactions with, Council Officers for both obtaining information and in general situations;

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- maintain transparent decision making and good governance arrangements;
- ensure the reputation of Council is enhanced by Councillors and Council Officers interacting consistently, professionally and positively in their day-to-day duties; and
- provide a clear and consistent framework through which breaches of the Policy will be managed in accordance with the Code of Conduct (Councillors) Policy and Code of Conduct (Council Officers) Policy.

# DRAFT COUNCILLOR AND COUNCIL OFFICER INTERACTION POLICY

POL-105.V#3

This policy is based on the Model Councillor and Staff Interaction Policy 2022 developed by the Department of Planning and Environment





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#### 1. INTRODUCTION

The <u>Councillor and Council Officer Interaction Policy</u> (the Policy) provides a framework for Councillors when exercising their civic functions by specifically addressing their ability to interact with and receive advice from authorised Council Officers.

This Policy provides direction on interactions between Councillors and Council Officers to assist both parties in carrying out their day-to-day duties professionally, ethically and respectfully.

It is important to have an effective working relationship that recognises the important but differing contribution both parties bring to their complementary roles.

This policy was previously known as the Access to Council Information and Staff by Councillors Policy.

#### 2. OBJECTIVES

The aim of the Policy is to facilitate a positive working relationship between Councillors, as the community's elected representatives and Council Officers, who are employed to administer the operations of Council.

The objectives of the Policy are:

- establish positive, effective and professional working relationships between Councillors and Council Officers defined by mutual respect and courtesy;
- enable Councillors and Council Officers to work together appropriately and effectively to support each other in their respective roles;
- ensure that Councillors receive advice in an orderly, courteous and appropriate manner to assist them in the performance of their civic duties;
- ensure Councillors have adequate access to information to exercise their statutory roles;
- provide direction on, and guide Councillor interactions with, Council Officers for both obtaining information and in general situations;
- maintain transparent decision making and good governance arrangements;
- ensure the reputation of Council is enhanced by Councillors and Council Officers interacting consistently, professionally and positively in their day-to-day duties; and
- provide a clear and consistent framework through which breaches of the Policy will be managed in accordance with the <u>Code of Conduct (Councillors) Policy</u> and <u>Code of Conduct (Council Officers)</u> Policy.

#### 3. SCOPE

This Policy applies:

- to all Councillors and Council Officers;
- to all interactions between Councillors and Council Officers, whether face-to-face, online (including social media and virtual meeting platforms), by phone, text message or in writing; and
- whenever interactions between Councillors and Council Officers occur, including inside or outside of work hours and at both Council and non-Council venues and events.

This Policy does not confer any delegated authority upon any person. All delegations to Council Officers are made by the Chief Executive Officer (CEO).

#### 4. LEGISLATION

- Local Government Act 1993 (NSW)
- Local Government (General) Regulations 2021 (NSW)
- Government Information (Public Access) Act 2009 (NSW)
- State Records Act 1998 (NSW)
- Work Health and Safety Act 2011 (NSW)

#### POLICY STATEMENT

This Policy complements, and should be read in conjunction with, Murray River Council's <u>Code of Conduct (Councillors) Policy</u> and the <u>Code of Conduct Procedure.</u>

The Code of Conduct Policy provides the Council Officials/Councillors must not conduct themselves in a manner that is contrary to any of Council's policies.

A breach of this Policy will be a breach of Council's Code of Conduct Policy.

#### 5. PRINCIPLES, ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- 5.1 Several factors contribute to a good relationship between Councillors and Council Officers. These include goodwill, understanding of roles, communication, protocols, and a good understanding of legislative requirements.
- 5.2 Council's governing body and its management team (being Council Officers within the organisation namely the Executive Leadership Team (ELT)) must have a clear and sophisticated understanding of their different roles, and the fact that these operate within a hierarchy. The management team is accountable to the CEO, who in turn, is accountable to the Council's governing body.
- 5.3 Section 232 of the Local Government Act 1993 (the Act) states that:

#### 232 The role of a councillor

- (1) The role of a councillor is as follows—
  - (a) to be an active and contributing member of the governing body,
  - (b) to make considered and well informed decisions as a member of the governing body,
  - (c) to participate in the development of the integrated planning and reporting framework,
  - (d) to represent the collective interests of residents, ratepayers and the local community,
  - (e) to facilitate communication between the local community and the governing body,
  - (f) to uphold and represent accurately the policies and decisions of the governing body,
  - (g) to make all reasonable efforts to acquire and maintain the skills necessary to perform the role of a councillor.
- (2) A councillor is accountable to the local community for the performance of the council.
- 5.4 The management team's role is to advise the governing body, implement Council's decisions and to oversee service delivery.
- 5.5 It is beneficial if the management team recognises the complex political environments in which elected members operate and acknowledge that they work within a system that is based on democratic governance. Councillors similarly need to understand that it is a highly complex task to prepare information and provide quality advice on the very wide range of issues that Council operations cover.
- 5.6 Council commits to the following principles to guide interactions between Councillors and Council Officers.

5.7 Councillors are members of the Council's governing body, which is responsible for directing and controlling the affairs of the Council in accordance with the Act.

Councillors need to accept that:

- responses to requests for information from Councillors may take time and consultation to prepare and be approved prior to responding;
- Council Officers are not accountable to them individually;
- they must not direct Council Officers except by giving appropriate direction to the CEO by way of a Council or committee resolution, or by the Mayor exercising their functions under Section 226 of the Act;
- they must not, in any public or private forum, direct or influence, or attempt to direct or influence a Council Officer in the exercise of their functions;
- they must not contact a Council Officer on Council-related business unless in accordance with this Policy; and
- they must not use their position to attempt to receive favourable treatment for themselves or others.
- 5.8 The CEO is responsible for the efficient and effective day-to-day operation of the Council and for ensuring that the lawful decisions of the Council are implemented without undue delay.

Council Officers need to understand:

- they are not accountable to individual Councillors and do not take direction from them. They
  are accountable to the CEO, who is in turn accountable to the Council's governing body;
- they should not provide advice to Councillors unless it has been approved by the CEO or a Council Officer/s with a delegation to approve advice to Councillors;
- they must carry out reasonable and lawful directions given by any person having the authority to give such directions in an efficient and effective manner;
- they must ensure that participation in political activities outside the service of the Council does not interfere with the performance of their official duties; and

they must provide full and timely information to Councillors sufficient to enable them to exercise their civic functions in accordance with this Policy.

#### 6. THE COUNCILLOR REQUESTS SYSTEM

- 6.1 Councillors have a right to request information, provided it is relevant to Councillor's exercise of their civic functions. This right does not extend to matters about which a Councillor is merely curious.
- 6.2 Councillors do not have a right to request information about matters that they are prevented from participating in decision-making on because of a conflict of interest, unless the information is otherwise publicly available.
- 6.3 The CEO may identify a Council Officer/s (the Councillor Support Officer/s) under this Policy for the management of requests from Councillors.
- 6.4 Councillors can use the Councillor Requests System to:
  - request information or ask questions that relate to the strategic position, performance or operation of the Council;
  - bring concerns that have been raised by members of the public to the attention of Council Officers;
  - request ICT or other support from the Council management team; and
  - request that a Council Officer be present at a meeting (other than a meeting of the Council) for the purpose of providing advice to the meeting.
- 6.5 Councillors must, to the best of their knowledge, be specific about what information they are requesting and make their requests respectfully. Where a Councillor's request lacks specificity, the CEO or Council Officer/s authorised to manage the matter is entitled to ask the Councillor to clarify their request and the reason(s) why they are seeking the information.
- 6.6 Council Officers must make every reasonable effort to assist Councillors with their requests and do so in a respectful manner.
- 6.7 Subject to the nature of the request, the CEO or the Council Officer/s authorised to manage a Councillor request will endeavour to provide a response within ten (10) working days. Where due to the nature of the request, a response cannot be provided within that timeframe, the Councillor will be advised of that fact and an estimated response time and the information will be provided as soon as practicable.
- 6.8 Requests under clause 6.4 (d) must be made five (5) working days before the meeting. The CEO or Council Officer/s authorised to manage a Councillor request are responsible for determining:
  - a) whether a Council Officer can attend the meeting; and
  - b) which Council Officer will attend the meeting.
  - Council Officers who attend such meetings must be appropriately senior and be subject matter experts on the issues to be discussed at the meeting.
- 6.9 Councillors are required to treat all information provided by Council Officers appropriately and to observe any confidentiality requirements.
- 6.10 Council Officers will inform Councillors of any confidentiality requirements for information they provide so Councillors can handle the information appropriately.
- 6.11 Where a Councillor is unsure of confidentiality requirements, they should contact the CEO or the Council Officer authorised to manage their request.
- 6.12 The CEO may refuse access to information requested by a Councillor if:
  - a) the information is not necessary for the performance of the Councillor's civic functions; and/or

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- if responding to the request would, in the CEO's opinion, result in an unreasonable diversion of Council Officers time and resources; and/or
- the Councillor has previously declared a conflict of interest in the matter and removed themselves from decision-making on it; and/or
- the CEO is prevented by law from disclosing the information.
- 6.13 Where the CEO refuses to provide information requested by a Councillor they must act reasonably. The CEO must advise the Councillor in writing of their reasons for refusing access to the information requested.
- 6.14 Where a Councillor's request for information is refused by the CEO on the grounds referred to under Clause 6.12 (a) or (b), the Councillor may instead request the information through a resolution of the Council by way of a notice of motion. This clause does not apply where the CEO refuses a Councillor's request for information under clause 6.12 (c) or (d).
- 6.15 Nothing in Clauses 6.12, 6.13, and 6.14 prevents a Councillor from requesting the information in accordance with the Government Information (Public Access) Act 2009.
- 6.16 Where a Councillor persistently makes requests for information which, in the CEO's opinion, result in a significant and unreasonable diversion of Council Officer time and resources the Council may, on the advice of the CEO, resolve to limit the number of requests the Councillor may make.
- 6.17 Councillor requests are state records and must be managed in accordance with the <u>State Records Act 1998.</u>
- 6.18 If requested, a report will be provided to Council regarding the performance and efficiency of the Councillor Requests System against established key performance indicators.

#### 7. ACCESS TO COUNCIL OFFICERS

- 7.1 Councillors may directly contact Council Officer/s that are authorised to manage a Councillor request.
- 7.2 Councillors should as far as practicable, only contact Council Officer/s during normal business hours.
- 7.3 If Councillors would like to contact a Council Officer, other than those authorised to manage a Councillor request, they must receive permission from the CEO.
- 7.4 If a Councillor is unsure which authorised Council Officer can help with their enquiry, they can contact the CEO or the Director Corporate Services who will provide advice about which authorised Council Officer/s to contact.
- 7.5 The CEO or a member of Council's Executive Leadership Team (ELT) may direct any Council Officer to contact Councillors to provide specific information or clarification relating to a specific matter.
- 7.6 A Councillor or Council Officer must not take advantage of their official position to improperly influence other Councillors or Council Officers in the performance of their civic or professional duties for the purposes of securing a private benefit for themselves or for another person. Such conduct should be immediately reported to the CEO or Mayor in the first instance, or alternatively to the Office of Local Government, NSW Ombudsman, or the NSW Independent Commission Against Corruption.

#### 8. COUNCILLOR ACCESS TO COUNCIL BUILDINGS

8.1 Councillors are entitled to have access to the Council Chamber, the Mayor's office (subject to availability) and public areas of Council's buildings during normal business hours for meetings. Councillors needing access to these facilities at other times must obtain approval from the CEO.

- 8.2 If the rooms outlined in Clause 8.1 are unavailable or unsuitable, Councillors may make a request to the CEO to utilise other meeting rooms. Granting of such a request is solely at the discretion of the CEO.
- 8.3 Councillors must not enter employee-only areas of Council buildings without the approval of the CEO.

#### 9. APPROPRIATE AND INAPPROPRIATE INTERACTIONS

- 9.1 Examples of appropriate interactions between Councillors and Council Officers include, but are not limited to, the following:
  - Councillors and Council Officers are courteous and display a positive and professional attitude towards one another;
  - Council Officers ensure that information necessary for Councillors to exercise their civic functions is made equally available to all Councillors, in accordance with this Policy and any other relevant Council policies;
  - Council Officers record the advice they give to Councillors in the same way they would if it was provided to members of the public;
  - Council Officers, including Council's executive team members, document Councillor requests via the Councillor requests system;
  - Council meetings and Councillor briefings are used to establish positive working relationships and help Councillors to gain an understanding of the complex issues related to their civic duties;
  - Councillors and Council Officers feel supported when seeking and providing clarification about Council related business; and
  - Councillors forward requests through the Councillor Requests System and Council Officers respond in accordance with the timeframes stipulated in this Policy.
- 9.2 Examples of inappropriate interactions between Councillors and Council Officers include, but are not limited to, the following:
  - Councillors and Council Officers conducting themselves in a manner which:
    - is contrary to their duties under the <u>Work Health and Safety Act 2011</u> (NSW) and their responsibilities under any policies or procedures adopted by the Council to ensure workplace health and safety; and
    - constitutes harassment and/or bullying within the meaning of the <u>Code of Conduct</u> or is unlawfully discriminatory.
  - Councillors approaching Council Officers and employee organisations to discuss individual or operational employee matters (other than matters relating to broader workforce policy such as, but not limited to, organisational restructures or outsourcing decisions), grievances, workplace investigations and disciplinary matters;
  - Council Officers approaching Councillors to discuss individual or operational employee matters (other than matters relating to broader workforce policy such as, but not limited to, organisational restructures or outsourcing decisions), grievances, workplace investigations and disciplinary matters;
  - Subject to clause 6.12, Council Officers refusing to give information that is available to other Councillors to a particular Councillor;
  - Councillors who have lodged an application with Council, discussing the matter with Council Officers in employee-only areas of the Council;
  - Councillors being overbearing or threatening to Council Officers;
  - Council Officers being overbearing or threatening to Councillors;

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### COUNCILLOR & COUNCIL OFFICER INTERACTION POLICY

- Councillors making personal attacks on Council Officers or engaging in conduct towards Council Officers that would be contrary to the general conduct provisions in Part 3 of the <u>Code</u> of <u>Conduct</u> in public forums including social media;
- Councillors directing or pressuring Council Officers in the performance of their work or recommendations they should make; and
- Council Officers providing ad-hoc advice to Councillors without recording or documenting the interaction as they would if the advice was provided to a member of the community.
- 9.3 Where a Councillor engages in conduct that, in the opinion of the CEO, puts the health, safety or welfare of Council Officers at risk, the CEO may restrict the Councillor's access to Council Officers.
- 9.4 Any concerns relating to the conduct of a Council Officer under this Policy should be raised with the CEO.

### 10. NON-COMPLIANCE / COMPLAINTS

- 10.1 The <u>Code of Conduct</u> provides that Council Officials must not conduct themselves in a manner that is contrary to the Council's policies. A breach of this Policy will be a breach of the Code of Conduct.
- 10.2 Complaints about a breach of this Policy should be made to the CEO (if the complaint is about a Councillor or a Council Officer), or the Mayor (if the complaint is about the CEO).
- 10.3 Clause 10.2 does not operate to prevent matters being reported to the Office of Local Government (OLG), the NSW Ombudsman, the NSW Independent Commission Against Corruption or any other external agency.

### 11. EVALUATION AND REVIEW

It is the responsibility of the <u>Director Corporate Services</u> to monitor the adequacy of this Policy and recommend appropriate changes.

This Policy will be formally reviewed every four (4) years or as needed, whichever comes first.

### 9.3.1 KYALITE HALL AND RECREATION RESERVE - ASSET DECOMMISSIONING

### RECOMMENDATION

That the Council resolve to receive and note the report on Kyalite Hall and Recreation Reserve - Asset Decommissioning.

### **BACKGROUND**

The community of Kyalite is located within two Local Government Areas, Murray River Council and Balranald Shire Council and is located on the Wakool River. The 2021 Census identified the population of this area as 87 with around 27 private dwellings.

The Kyalite Hall, associated toilets and the existing Recreation Reserve Assets (excluding the NSW RFS Shed) have been assessed as end-of-life. This determination has been confirmed by CT Management Group's Asset Condition Assessment (June 2021) and reaffirmed in the APV Comprehensive Valuation (31/12/2024).

The section 355 Committee of Management for the Hall and Recreation Reserve was officially dissolved on 26 November 2024. Unfortunately, these facilities have been left vacant and unused for many years.

The Kyalite community have a number of alternate facilities which they can utilise in lieu of the hall. The closest alternative facility is the Kyalite Pub which has a function room. Other alternative facilities include Tooleybuc Recreation Reserve Hall / Pavilion and the Goodnight Hall.

### **DISCUSSION**

The following assets have been identified as being at end-of-life and require decommissioning:

Demolition of these end-of-life assets is supported by the following:

- Asset Management Strategy Version 3 (Adopted by Council 13 May 2025),
- Buildings Strategy 2024 2034 (adopted 23 July 2024),
- Parks and Open Spaces Strategy 2024 2034 (adopted 23 July 2024),

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- Revenue Taskforce Report,
- CT Management Group Asset Assessment and associated Maintenance / Renewal Plan (dated June 2021).

Although these assets are no longer utilised by the community, Council has undertaken a range of engagement activities to ensure that any stakeholders with an interest in the Hall and Recreation Reserve were consulted and aware of Council's intent to demolish these end-of-life assets. Stakeholder engagement extended to:

- NSW Crown Lands
- Kyalite Progress and Recreational Reserve Association (transitioning to Kyalite Community Inc.)
- Kyalite Community
  - Erection of signage at the Hall site and at the Kyalite Pub
  - Media release on Council's website under News and Notices
  - Social media posts (e.g. Facebook)

The engagement processes included the option for contacting Council's Buildings and Facilities Team to raise any concerns or feedback. At the completion of the engagement, Council did not receive any objections to the demolition of the identified assets.

Further details in relation to the assets identified for decommissioning and engagement undertaken is included in the attachment.

Assets are at end-of-like and pose a safety risk to the public. Also, they are considered to be unoccupied buildings and as such insurance protection is limited.

Assets are not demolished and continue to deteriorate and remain unused.

What are the consequences of the event happening?

Moderate.

What is the likelihood of the event happening?

Likely.

Adequacy of existing controls?

Existing controls are not adequate.

Treatment options to mitigate the risk?

Demolish the assets to eliminate the risk.

### CONCLUSION

The engagement plan has been executed and completed. Council did not receive any objections in relation to the demolition of the Hall and identified Recreation Reserve Assets. Crown Lands consent is not required as Murray River Council is the Crown Land Manager.

Demolition of the assets is development permitted without consent in accordance with 2.73(3)(c) of the *State Environmental Planning Policy (Transport and Infrastructure) 2021*. A Division 5.1 Environmental Impact Assessment is required to be completed prior to demolition commencing. Council will seek quotes in accordance with procurement policy to demolish all identified assets.

The demolition of assets is expected to be completed around December 2025.

# 9.4.1 AMENDMENT TO FEES AND CHARGES - COMPLYING DEVELOPMENT CERTIFICATES

### RECOMMENDATION

- That Council resolve to amend current fees and charges in relation to Complying Development Certificates – 1a to 10b by basing the assessment fees on the total cost of works, inclusive of the planning assessment component; and
- 2. In accordance with Section 610F of the *Local Government Act 1993*, place the amended fee on public exhibition for a period of 28 days.

### **BACKGROUND**

In previous years fees for Complying Development Certificates (CDC's) were determined by the total cost of works. However, Council's current fees and charges for 2025/2026 are based on a fixed rate dependant on the class of building as out lined below:

In 2024, the following fees and charges were added to the schedule to conduct pre assessments of the planning legislation to determine whether a proposed development could be applied for as Complying Development:

### **DISCUSSION**

The service for a CDC assessment has not been utilised extensively since Council's adoption of fees and charges for 2025/26. However, recent discussions with builders have indicated some do favour the Complying Development route which is a combined "fast tracked" planning and building approval common for Class 1 and 10 buildings.

Council officers have researched this situation and found that our current fee structure based on a fixed rate dependant on the class of the building is not reflective of the true cost of the time spent on the assessment involved (ie, it is too high).

To address this situation, it is recommended that Council amend the current fixed rate fee structure for Complying Development Certificates to align with the 2025/2026 Construction Certificate fees and include the Assessment of CDC eligibility fees (see below). This will reflect the added assessment items for a CDC application whilst keeping the fees at a competitive level and more reflective of surrounding Councils and Private Certifiers.

  - (b) The regulations in accordance with which the fee is determined are amended, The council must give public notice (in accordance with section 705) for at least 28 days of the fee proposed for the new or changed service or the fee determined in accordance with the amended regulations.
- 4. This section does not apply to a fee determine by a council for an application made in a filming proposal, if that fee is consistent with a scale or structure of fees set out in an applicable filming protocol.

Steps will be taken to optimise the viability of committees where appropriate; consider the scope of support council will provide to support committees; determine the criteria that will trigger council's intervention in the operations of Section 355 committees, and what the intervention will be; plan for contingency management options, and fully recognise the cost of this in council's long term financial plans.

### General Business:

**Subcommittee centenary meetings:** It was noted that we have had 6 general meetings since early November to cover all the planning and work needing to be done for the centenary. Most of this meetings general business will also focus on the centenary.

### Hall Maintenance and Repairs:

**Power Upgrade:** Everybody is very happy with the power upgrade, and it has improved the lighting in hall significantly. Thank you to Dave Dundee for coordinating and organising this.

Floor Upgrade: The floor has finally been finished after many delays. It still requires another coat so Kim has contacted Brent to see what can be organised. The floor required extensive sanding and was the driest floor Brent had ever experienced. Consequently, there was an enormous amount of dust in the hall all over walls and everything. Kim contacted and organised Lee Codling to assist with professional cleaning of this and it is greatly improved. At the last working bee both back rooms had a thorough clean.

The floor has improved significantly, however, some filling work and hopefully another coat will enhance it further. We thank Dave Dundee for organising the repair work and replacement of damaged floorboards.

Ceiling Lining: The cost of repairing and replacing the collapsing cork tiles is approximately \$40000, which did include new lighting which has since been completed. So, cost could be a little lower. Dave Dundee sought the quote for this. MRC will contribute \$15000 so an infrastructure grant of \$20000 was applied for with Grain Corp. We were unsuccessful. Kim will continue to apply for other infrastructure grants (FRRR) etc. as all agreed this work is needed to be done asap. It would have been nice to have the work completed before the centenary but will work on having it done in the near future. Will continue to review finances re the replacement of the lining and hoping that there is possibly some heritage related funding available for the use toward this project.

**Roadway around hall:** Kim emailed Bernie Carne re having a load of road base delivered to hall and spread around the road around the hall due to the large volume of traffic that will occur on the day, and the roadway hasn't been resurfaced or maintained for many years.

This has been agreed on and Bernie has assured Kim this will be completed prior to the event. The Parks team are working on this and Bernie advised Kim that as per Council policy & procedures, the rock has been put on our system out for quoting and the works will be organised as soon as this process is completed. We thank Bernie Carne for getting this organised.

**Internet Banking:** Discussion occurred that this is required now due to the large volume of accounts needing to be paid etc. All agreed and a motion was put forward by G, Morton, Sec K. Best stating that Mereeka Andrews as treasurer be given access to net banking. The motion was carried unanimously to get online banking in place with our current bank account:

The motion was carried with all in favour and M. Andrews will organise this asap.

Heritage Citation: This was again raised as we haven't received any formal correspondence about this. Karen had attempted to follow up with this and we were given some time with a museum advisory consultant, Kim Biggs, who met with Kim to discuss where to later store some of the significant historical material we have such as the original minute/cash books, title etc. Advice was also given re displays for the day of the centenary and we have taken her advice of having some things printed onto foam boards in addition to displays on boards of photos and news articles relating to Goodnight. The committee would like to enquire whether we have access to any additional funding relating to heritage sources. In addition, we would like the halls age documented somewhere as there are not a lot of halls left within the MRC area that are of this age.

### **Centenary Organisation:**

Photo displays for Centenary: Two large boards have been collected for Tooleybuc Sporting Club to display photos, news articles etc. Can get more boards as needed. Will cover these in black plastic and begin these at the next working bee. Will need staple guns, photos and display signs to be made up of each different display e.g. Christmas tree, Old Balls, Tennis etc. S. Gillbee will help with the mounting and display of photos and headings.

Day event: discussion occurred around stall holders. Kim has approached Chisletts. Sarah Best will follow this up. Mereeka is contacting Chasney estate, Grace garlic, Wood Wood Honey and Tracey Main re centenary memorabilia for visitors to purchase. Mereeka in discussions with Andrew Peace wines and Chloe Kelly. Kim has spoken with Erin, and she will bring organic sultanas and other items for display on day.

David Hepburn confirmed that their old car will be on display with a range of artworks on it for sale. He also spoke of other old cars from local car clubs including John Algie coming on the day and Mereeka spoke of Bill Hawthorn bringing some old machinery.

### Signage

There has been ongoing communication regarding the walking Goodnight signs relating to the hall history, Goodnight school and Bitch and Pups. Kim to continue to work with Izzy Rees (previously Julia Druitt) and it is essential these are installed before the centenary event. Kim has been trying

to organise a time for the footings subcontractor to meet Greg at the hall re location but to date this is still getting organised.

Dylan Mc Farlane has produced the lazer cut letters and Steve Cole is constructing the Goodnight Hall sign which states Goodnight Hall, est. 1925. This is almost completed and will be installed at the next working bee. We thank Steve for his time in making the frame etc. for the sign.

Calendars: these have finally been completed and Kim and Greg collected them from Echuca printers. Everyone was very happy with the results. Calendars to be placed at Tooleybuc Sporting Club, Tooleybuc PO and Tooleybuc School for sale, \$20 each. In addition, those present had some calendars distributed to them to sell. On the day of centenary, we will sell them as well.

**Ball Prizes** were discussed. Several prizes will be awarded on the night consisting of donated goods such as wine, nuts etc. and these shall be distributed throughout the evening. A lucky door cash prize was also discussed and this was agreed to.

Timeline of events: G. Pappin suggested getting this organised to help with the smooth running of the event. All agreed and will finalise this soon. At present we will however contact vendors to set up between 9- 9.30am. Speeches to commence between 1.30-2pm so that the afternoon tea is served prior to 3pm. Hopefully the day event will conclude by 4.30 pm at the latest so that the ball can be set up and band will arrive around 5pm to set up plus the caterer. Cool rooms are to be set up the day before and also the marquees.

**Safety:** G. Pappin raised the issue regarding road safety as the hall is near a well-used road. All agreed we need speed limits of 40km/hr. and signs stating event in progress leading to the hall from Goodnight. Kim will investigate this and then designate someone to do the follow up. We thank Cr Pappin for his advice.

Danny Andrews will organise witches' hats and flag ropes to be distributed around the hall and designated parking areas.

Accessible toilet. This issue was raised as we don't have one. Kim will email Bernie Carne to investigate whether the MRC can provide one for the event.

Hall hire and equipment hire: to remain the same as in the past.

Working Bee and follow up meeting: Next working bee has been organised for Sunday 14<sup>th</sup> September at 9.30 am. Meeting date will be organised in near future.

MRC updates: Cr Pappin advised the committee that the LEP is out and on display for 28 days on the website and feedback can be provided on this. As a small committee we are rather busy with the centenary at the moment, but individuals are encouraged to look at it. Possibly some further consultation drop ins on this could have enabled greater viewing of it.

### 9.4.4 DRAFT COUNCIL-RELATED DEVELOPMENT APPLICATIONS POLICY

### RECOMMENDATION

That Murray River Council resolve to:

1. Adopt the DRAFT Council Related Development Applications Policy V#1 and place the document on public display for a period of at least 28 days.

### **BACKGROUND**

As a result of amendments to the Environmental Planning and Assessment Regulation 2021, Councils are required to have an adopted policy on the Management of Conflicts of Interest when determining development applications submitted by Council, Council staff or Councillors. A draft policy has been prepared for Council endorsement and public exhibition.

### **DISCUSSION**

In late 2019, the NSW Ombudsman finalised an investigation into allegations that Broken Hill City had breached the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979 by allowing its own unfinished Civic Centre to be used for large a public function, despite not having the necessary certification that it was safe to do so. As a result of an investigation. The NSW Ombudsman concluded that the dual role of Councils as applicant and regulator created potential conflicts of interest, and it is a systemic issue that needs to be addressed. Subsequently, amendments to the Environmental Planning and Assessment Regulation 2021 require Councils to:

- have a formal conflict of interest policy,
- consider the policy before determining any development applications that are council related, and

### 1. INTRODUCTION

This policy has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of Section 66A of the <u>Environmental Planning and Assessment Regulation 2021</u> (EPA Regs) and the <u>Council-related Development Application Conflict of Interest Guidelines</u> (the Guidelines) issued by the Department of Planning and Environment.

Council operates as a consent authority and development regulator for the Murray River Council Local Government Area (LGA). In some circumstances, Council can also be the developer, landowner or hold a commercial interest in the land they regulate.

Where Council has this dual role, a potential conflict can arise between their interests in the development and their duty as regulator.

This Policy explains how Council will identify matters in which these potential conflicts arise and address them throughout the development process.

This policy has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of Section 66A of the <u>Environmental Planning and Assessment Regulation 2021</u> (EPA Regs) and the <u>Council-related Development Application Conflict of Interest Guidelines</u> (the Guidelines) issued by the Department of Planning and Environment.

### 2. OBJECTIVES

The objective of this Policy is to manage potential conflicts of interest and increase transparency at all stages of the development process for council related development.

### SCOPE

This policy applies to council-related development or development on council land that requires development consent under Part 4 of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979 (EPA Act).

This policy does not apply to any works carried out under Part 5 of the EPA Act.

### 5. POLICY STATEMENT

# 5.1 Process for identifying and managing potential conflicts of interest

5.1.1 Management controls and strategies:

Council-Related Development Policy V#1

- 5.1.2 The following management controls are to be applied to:
  - a. the assessment of an application for Council-related development:
    - Development applications with an estimated development cost ) of \$5,000,000 or less will be assessed by Council's Manager Development Services, or an independent Planning Consultant as determined by the CEO.
    - The applicant/proponent (including Council Department Managers) shall only engage with the assessing officer/s of the development application, the same as any other member of the public.
    - A Management Strategy is to be provided specifying how the council will manage conflicts of interest that may arise in connection with the application because the council is the consent authority.

Adopted: DRAFT

The application is not to be prioritised purely due to being a Council related application.

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- The development application shall be placed on public exhibition for a minimum of twenty-eight (28) days. This will be via notice on Council's website and the NSW Planning Portal and notification to adjoining property owners where relevant.
- The Determination and Assessment Report will be published on Council's website, and copies provided to any individual adjoining properties notified during the assessment process.

### b. the determination of an application for Council-related development:

- Council related development with an estimated development cost of \$5,000,000 or less shall be determined by the CEO (or their delegate).
- ▶ In accordance with State Environmental Planning Policy (Planning Systems) 2021, Schedule 6, Council related development with an estimated development cost of more than \$5,000,000 shall be determined by the Western Regional Planning Panel, a statutory body independent of Council.

### c. the regulation and enforcement of approved Council-related development:

- The regulation and enforcement of council-related development shall be the same as for any other approved application, in accordance with relevant regulation.
- 5.2.2 The management strategy for the following kinds of development is that no management controls need to be applied:
  - commercial fit outs and minor changes to the building façade
  - internal alterations or additions to buildings that are not a heritage item
  - signage which does not generate a commercial return
  - minor building structures projecting from a building facade over public land (such as awnings, verandas, bay windows, flagpoles, pipes, and services)
  - development where Murray River Council might receive a small fee for the use of their land.
  - minor modifications to an existing development approval.

### 6. RESPONSIBILITIES

Responsibilities for the implementation of this Policy are shared as follows.

# 7. EVALUATION AND REVIEW

It is the responsibility of the Director Planning and Environment, to monitor the adequacy of this Policy and recommend appropriate changes.

This Policy will be formally reviewed every four (4) years or as needed, whichever comes first.

### 8. NON-COMPLIANCE

Non-compliance with this Policy may be taken to be a breach of Council's Code of Conduct.

Complaints alleging non-compliance with this Policy must be made in accordance with the Code of Conduct and will be dealt with in accordance with the Procedures for the Administration of the Code of Conduct.

#### RECOMMENDATION

That Council resolve to support the proposed Planning Proposal requesting an amendment to remove the existing Clause 5.22 "Special flood considerations" from the Wakool LEP 2013 and the Murray LEP 2011, as outlined in Attachment 1.

#### **BACKGROUND**

At the Council Meeting, held on 28 September 2021, Council resolved to adopt the new *Clause 5.22* "Special flood considerations" in the *Wakool LEP 2013* and the *Murray LEP 2011* (refer resolution 190921).

The objectives of Clause 5.22 are as follows—

- (a) to enable the safe occupation and evacuation of people subject to flooding,
- (b) to ensure development on land is compatible with the land's flood behaviour in the event of a flood,
- (c) to avoid adverse or cumulative impacts on flood behaviour,
- (d) to protect the operational capacity of emergency response facilities and critical infrastructure during flood events,
- (e) to avoid adverse effects of hazardous development on the environment during flood events.

Since the adoption of and inclusion of the Moama Flood Risk Management Strategy &Plan (FRMS&P), sufficient flood function mapping has been provided for extreme flooding events in the Moama area, which is where a significant portion of flooding has occurred geographically in recent years.

The aim of this Planning Proposal to remove Clause 5.22 "Special flood considerations" from the Wakool LEP 2013 and the Murray LEP 2011, following the adoption of the Moama FRMS&P, ensures that where sensitive or hazardous uses are proposed between the flood planning level (FPL) and probable maximum flood (PMF), that there are adequate controls applied via flood function mapping and respective Flood Planning Constraint Category (FPCC) controls, as well as appropriate controls under any future Murray River Council Development Control Plan (DCP).

# **SUMMARY**

It is proposed to remove Clause 5.22 "Special flood considerations" from the Wakool LEP 2013 and the Murray LEP 2011, as part of the recent adoption of the Moama FRMS&P, as it will no longer serve to have statutory effect and will be superseded by this adopted FRMS&P. It is recommended that Council resolves to progress the Planning Proposal, as submitted in **Attachment 1** to this report by seeking an administrative amendment to remove Clause 5.22 from the Wakool LEP 2013 and the Murray LEP 2011.

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# **PROPOSAL**

This proposal is for an administrative amendment to remove an existing Clause (5.22 "Special flood considerations") from the Wakool LEP 2013 and the Murray LEP 2011, following the recent adoption of the Moama FRMS&P.

Clause 5.22 contains controls relating to "Special flood considerations", which have been superseded now that the Moama FRMS&P is adopted, given flood function mapping is available under this FRMS&P and in the extreme event of flooding.

At the direction of the Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water (DCCEEW) in December 2025 it was stated that Clause 5.22 is 'too restrictive, as the extreme event extent encompasses most of the urban area and a significant warning time is now available for the area for riverine flooding.' In May 2025, the Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure (DPHI) also agreed to Council's recommendation that a Planning Proposal would be the most appropriate action required to remove the Clause (See Attachment 1) following the adoption of the Moama FRMS&P.

A resolution of Council is therefore required to prepare the amendment in accordance with Section 3.22 "Expedited amendments of environmental planning instruments" of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act, 1979 (EP&A Act 1979). **CONSULTATION** 

Consultation has occurred via discussions with internal planning and engineering departments within Murray River Council, with the Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water (DCCEEW), and with the Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure (DPHI). Feedback confirmed that there is no benefit of retaining or amending *Clause 5.22* in the *Wakool LEP 2013* and the *Murray LEP 2011*, following on from the adoption of the Moama FRMS&P.

Public exhibition has not been undertaken for this proposal but will be required as part of the Planning Proposal submission.

# **IMPLICATIONS**

# A. Policy Implications:

The LEP amendment will assist to ensure both the *Wakool LEP 2013* and the *Murray LEP 2011* are up-to-date and continue to provide relevant and current direction for development in the Murray River Council LGA, until both are amalgamated into one.

The proposed amendment will be consistent with all relevant policies, planning strategies and directions. There will be no implications relating to Council's Strategies, State Environmental Planning Policies, or Ministerial Directions.

# B. **Environmental Implications:**

There will be no environmental impacts associated with the removal of the Clause from the *Wakool LEP 2013* and the *Murray LEP 2011* as it has been superseded by the inclusion of sufficient flood function mapping, as part of the Moama FRMS&P, and therefore has no statutory effect.

# C. Social Implications:

There will be no social impacts associated with the removal of the expired clause from the *Wakool LEP 2013* and the *Murray LEP 2011* as it has been superseded by the inclusion of sufficient flood function mapping, as part of the Moama FRMS&P, and therefore has no statutory effect.

# D. Infrastructure Asset Implications:

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There are no asset or infrastructure impacts associated with the removal of the expired clause from the *Wakool LEP 2013* and the *Murray LEP 2011* as it has been superseded by the inclusion of sufficient flood function mapping, as part of the Moama FRMS&P, and therefore has no statutory effect.

# E. Financial Implications:

There are no financial impacts associated with the removal of the expired clause from the *Wakool LEP 2013* and the *Murray LEP 2011* as it has been superseded by the inclusion of sufficient flood function mapping, as part of the Moama FRMS&P, and therefore has no statutory effect.

# F. Risk and Insurance Implications:

The preparation of an LEP amendment to the *Wakool LEP 2013* and the *Murray LEP 2011* is a regular Council activity governed by the provisions of the *EP&A Act 1979*. The level of risk attached to this activity has been minimised by following processes established by the *EP&A Act 1979*, the Department of Planning and Environment, and Council's established processes and procedures.

# CONCLUSION

It is recommended that Council resolve to support the proposed Planning Proposal requesting an amendment to remove the existing Clause 5.22 "Special flood considerations" from the Wakool LEP 2013 and the Murray LEP 2011, as outlined in Attachment 1.

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# **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

This Planning Proposal has been prepared as an administrative amendment to remove an existing Clause (5.22 "Special flood considerations") from the Wakool LEP 2013 and the Murray LEP 2011. This has come about as part of the recent endorsement of the Moama Flood Risk Management Study & Plan (FRMS&P) at the July 2025 Council meeting, and its adoption.

Clause 5.22 contains controls relating to "Special Flood Considerations", which are superseded given that flood function mapping has been made available under the recently adopted Moama FRMS&P. The Clause is also now considered to be too restrictive, as the extreme event extent encompasses most of the Murray River Council area and a significant warning time is now available for the area when regarding riverine flooding. Therefore, the clause no longer serves to have a statutory effect.

The Planning Proposal is consistent with the Riverina Murray Region Plan 2041, the Murray River LSPS 2020 -2040, the Moama FRMS&P 2025 and State Environmental Planning Policies. It is suggested that the Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure (DPHI) proceed with the administrative amendment to the Wakool LEP 2013 and the Murray LEP 2011 to remove Clause 5.22, as submitted in the Appendices to this report, based on merit-based assessment.

This report assesses the merits of the Planning Proposal in accordance with the Department of Planning and Environment's Local Environmental Plan Making Guideline (August 2023). A Gateway determination is sought pursuant to Section 3.34 of the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act* 1979. The proposal is also consistent with the section 9.1 Ministerial Directions.



# PART 1 - OBJECTIVES AND INTENDED OUTCOMES

#### Proposal:

This proposal is for an administrative Local Environmental Plan (LEP) Amendment to the *Wakool LEP* 2013 and the *Murray LEP* 2011 for the removal of optional Clause 5.22 relating to "Special Flood Considerations", which is detailed in **Appendix 1**.

# Objective

To amend the Wakool LEP 2013 and the Murray LEP 2011 to remove optional Clause 5.22 "Special Flood Considerations".

#### **Intended Outcomes**

- That DPHI make the amendments to remove optional Clause 5.22 "Special Flood Considerations" from the Wakool LEP 2013 and the Murray LEP 2011, in accordance with the provisions of Section 3.22 of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act, 1979, as outlined in Appendix 1, subject to the adoption of the Moama FRMS&P. This recommendation follows (as specified on page 56 of the Moama Flood Risk Management Study and Plan 2025), consultation with the technical group of engineers and planners from the Murray Council and NSW DCCEEW.
  - To reduce unnecessary development constraints in Moama and surrounding areas, where Clause 5.22 currently applies to all urban land due to the widespread nature of "extreme" flood mapping.
  - To align local planning controls with practical flood risk management, recognising that Murray River Council is one of very few regional councils to have adopted this clause.
  - To support more flexible and feasible development opportunities, particularly in areas where Clause 5.22 has proven overly restrictive and has encumbered land that would otherwise be suitable for development.
  - To acknowledge the long lead time for flood warnings (typically 1 to 2 weeks for riverine flooding), which allows for effective evacuation planning and risk mitigation in Moama and its surrounds.

# PART 2 - EXPLANATION OF PROVISIONS

The Murray River Council local government area (LGA) is largely built along the riverbanks of the Murray River and Edward River. The Murray River catchment is a complex catchment considered to be high risk, as noted in the 2022 Independent NSW Flood Inquiry.



In February 2022, flooding caused significant damage to properties and assets within the Murray River Council area due to flood rises above the flood planning level. This including damage to development listed below in **Appendix 1** and under Standard Instrument LEP Clause 5.22. As such, Council previously requested that the optional Clause 5.22 be inserted into the *Wakool LEP 2013* and *Murray LEP 2011*.

Since the inclusion of this Clause, and after the adoption of the Moama FRMS&P 2025 there has been direction given by way of the Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water (DCCEEW) in December 2024, that subject to the adoption of the Moama FRMS&P; Clause 5.22 is 'too restrictive, as the extreme event extent encompasses most of the urban area and a significant warning time is now available for the area for riverine flooding.' (see **Appendix 2**). In May 2025, the Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure (DPHI) also agreed to Council's recommendation that a Planning Proposal would be the most appropriate action required to remove the Clause (see **Appendix 3**).

In determining the appropriateness of removing Clause 5.22, consideration has been given to strategic documentation, future flooding events, and whether flood inundation could pose an unacceptable risk to the surrounding environment or people (refer to Section 3 (B) - Table 1). Considering this information, it is not deemed necessary for the optional Clause 5.22 to be included under the Murray River Council LGA.

# PART 3 – JUSTIFICATION OF STRATEGIC AND SITE-SPECIFIC MERIT

Section A - Need for the Planning Proposal

#### 1. Is the Planning Proposal a result of an endorsed LSPS, strategic study or report?

The Planning Proposal is not a result of an endorsed LSPS, strategic study or report, but a result of the recently endorsed and adopted Moama Flood Risk and Management Study (FRMS&P) 2025. The Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water (DCCEEW), advised in December 2024 that subject to the adoption of the Moama FRMS&P; Clause 5.22 is 'too restrictive, as the extreme event extent encompasses most of the urban area and a significant warning time is now available for the area for riverine flooding.' (see Appendix 2).

# 2. Is the Planning Proposal the best means of achieving the objectives or intended outcomes, or is there a better way?

In accordance with the Moama Flood Risk and Management Study & Plan (FRMS&P) 2025, and as agreed to by DCCEEW and DPHI, the removal of optional Clause 5.22 via a planning proposal represents the most appropriate and effective means of achieving the intended flood risk management objectives and outcomes.



# Section B - Relationship to the strategic planning framework

3. Will the Planning Proposal give effect to the objectives and actions of the applicable regional or district plan or strategy (including any exhibited draft plans or strategies)?

Yes. The Planning Proposal gives effect to the objectives and actions of the Riverina Murray Region Plan 2041. The relevant planning proposal is addressed in Table 1:

# 12. What are the views of State and Federal public authorities and government agencies consulted in order to inform the Gateway determination?

Consultation was previously conducted with the Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water (DCCEEW), who in December 2024, stated that subject to the adoption of the Moama FRMS&P; Clause 5.22 is 'too restrictive, as the extreme event extent encompasses most of the urban area and a significant warning time is now available for the area for riverine flooding.' (see **Appendix 2**). In May 2025, the Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure (DPHI) also agreed to Council's recommendation that a Planning Proposal would be the most appropriate action required to remove the Clause (see Appendix 3). State and federal public authorities and government agencies will be consulted in line with any Gateway condition as the Planning Proposal progresses.

The Planning Proposal does not include changes to any mapping. It only involves removing an optional clause from the Standard Instrument LEP into the Wakool LEP 2013 and the Murray LEP 2011. The clause as proposed to be removed is provided at **Appendix 1**.

Council will conduct community consultation in accordance with any Gateway determination. Public exhibition will be undertaken in accordance with the DPE *Local Environmental Plan Making Guideline* – August 2023 and Council's Community Engagement Strategy 2024.

- 5.22 Special flood considerations
- (1) The objectives of this clause are as follows:
  - (a) to enable the safe occupation and evacuation of people subject to flooding.
  - (b) to ensure development on land is compatible with the land's flood behaviour in the event of a flood.
  - (c) to avoid adverse or cumulative impacts on flood behaviour.
  - (d) to protect the operational capacity of emergency response facilities and critical infrastructure during flood events.
  - (e) to avoid adverse effects of hazardous development on the environment during flood events.
- (2) This clause applies to:
  - (a) for sensitive and hazardous development land between the flood planning area and the probable maximum flood, and
  - (b) for development that is not sensitive and hazardous development land the consent authority considers to be land that, in the event of a flood, may:
    - i. cause a particular risk to life, and
    - ii. require the evacuation of people or other safety considerations.
- (3) Development consent must not be granted to development on land to which this clause applies unless the consent authority is satisfied that the development:
  - (a) will affect the safe occupation and efficient evacuation of people in the event of a flood.
  - (b) incorporates appropriate measures to manage risk to life in the event of a flood.
  - (c) will adversely affect the environment in the event of a flood.
- (4) A word or expression used in this clause has the same meaning as it has in the Considering Flooding in Land Use Planning Guideline unless it is otherwise defined in this clause.
- (5) In this clause:

flood planning area - see clause 5.21(5).

Sorry for the delayed response I have been on the road this week and wanted to clarify some issues before we responded.

- Your proposed approach looks reasonable; however, we just want to clarify/offer some changes:

  1. The FRM Manual guideline FB01 (<u>Understanding and Managing Flood Risk | NSW Environment and Heritage</u>) recommends that the most restrictive Flood Planning Constraint Category (FPCC) 1 should encompass the floodways, key storage areas and areas of H8 hazard in the design flood event (DFE). What you've proposed is similar to the FPCC1 presented in the FRM Manual. However, you could also include the one of the two storage area categories (referred to in your point 2) in this category if the planning and development controls will be similar. The FRM Manual suggests that "Developing in FPCC1 areas, including in existing developed areas, should generally be limited to those uses that are compatible with the flood function and flood hazard in the area. This means that the majority of new development types and more intense development are likely to be excluded from FPCC1 due to their impacts on flood behaviour and their vulnerability to the degree of flood hazard. This statement is generally consistent with what we were discussing about the more restrictive flood storage area east of Moama
  - 2. As above, consider adopting the criteria, or similar, for the FPCC1 from the FRM Manual could help address this issue.
  - 3. Given that the Moama Town Levee (MTL) is providing protection from the DFE and has around 0.4 m of freeboard on the earthen section and 0.2 m of freeboard on the concrete retaining wall section, it may be reasonable to exclude the area behind the MTL from the proposed Flood Planning Area (FPA) (are circled in yellow below). Council should be aware and understand the risk associated with this and the potential legal implications, as this is not entirely consistent with the FRM Manual. It should be discussed in the FRMS&P why this area has been excluded from the FPA and what assumptions have been made (regarding what Council will do to ensure there is no risk to area behind the MTL in 1% AEP) to justify the decision. Assumptions, and associated recommendations, to be documented should include at minimum:
    - a. Council will permanently upgrade the MTL to ensure sufficient freeboard;
    - b. Areas of insufficient freeboard will be 'topped up' in preparation for imminent flood events in the interim; and
    - c. The Levee Owners Manual (LOM) will be updated immediately to reflect the known risks and interim temporary measures

The breakout area at the Tindarra Resort location is different and should be included in the FPA given there is nothing formal (levee or

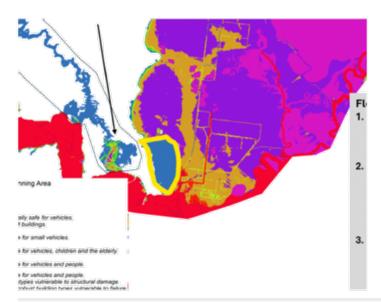

Hi all

Thanks for todays session to work through the way forward for the planning outcomes from the Moama Flood Risk Management Study.

The discussion was good, I think we are all in general alignment, but I would like your direction on the following.

- 1. Il have proposed using the 1% AEP floodway area as one of the planning categories. There was general support today for me manually cleaning up the floodway through east Moama, and extending it up north of the railway. I pointed out a few residential parcels with a current dwelling that this would cover, are you supportive of that? If so, are there any specific criteria or text that you would like to see for those parcels that already have residential development on them to support and maintain their existing use?
- 2. If have proposed a large area of flood storage, which I think could be differentiated into two categories, the residential area of East Moama (and perhaps some holiday parks), and the remaining rural use areas. Are you supportive of this? I mentioned that the current DCP discourages new development or intensification in these areas, but some language leaves the door ajar for "special circumstances". How hard do you want to go in terms of shutting this door and avoiding future arguments around developing in East Moama? Could you please consider the current DCP wording and suggest areas (if any) you would like to see changed under High Hazard Flood Storage.
- I believe everyone was supportive of splitting the flood fringe areas into the areas I had nominated (behind the town levee, behind Tindarra levee, and everywhere else). Nothing to do unless there is a change to this you would like to make.
- 4. I suggest removing the current clause from the LEP that requires you to consider the impact and safety to people during evacuation in areas impacted up to the PMF. This would also allow you to remove reference to the FPA2 from the current DCP. As I said, testing has shown the floodplain is insensitive to minor ring levees etc, and we have plenty of warning time for evac. Can you confirm you are happy with this approach.

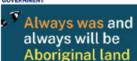

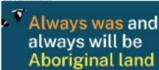

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

That Council:

- Authorise the Chief Executive Officer to accept the grant of \$1,078,164 (excluding GST) and execute the funding deed under the NSW Sustainable Communities Program for the Moama CBD Entry Redevelopment Project; and
- 2. Approve an additional contribution of \$169,036 in unbudgeted funds to the project, bringing Council's total contribution to \$369,036.

# **BACKGROUND**

Council has successfully secured funding under the NSW Sustainable Communities Program (SCP) for the Moama CBD Entry Redevelopment Project.

When the NSW Sustainable Communities Program (SCP) Early Investment Round was announced in March 2025, Council promptly shared information about the grant opportunity with the wider community. Council also provided letters of support to several community-led applications. At the same time, staff identified and prepared a Council-led application, with applications assessed on an open and competitive basis.

The purpose of the SCP is to minimise the social and economic impacts of Australian Government water recovery measures on Basin communities by funding investment-ready projects that:

- stimulate economic activity,
- support local businesses,
- create and support jobs, and
- deliver new or upgraded infrastructure that contributes to local economic activity and connectivity

Staff identified the Moama CBD Entry Redevelopment Project as the most suitable project for this funding round because it:

- was fully scoped, with detailed concept designs and cost estimates already prepared through the Meninya Street Master Plan process,
- met the requirement for projects to be investment-ready and able to commence within six months of signing the funding deed
- satisfied the eligibility requirement for a Council co-contribution
- demonstrated clear alignment with Council's adopted strategies and the SCP's objectives to stimulate economic activity, attract private investment, create jobs and deliver enduring community benefit.

The submitted application outlined how the project would prepare a key gateway site for redevelopment, deliver accessible public infrastructure, create construction and ongoing jobs, and catalyse further private investment along Meninya Street. The application was assessed as eligible and has now been awarded funding.

Moama CBD Entry Redevelopment Project Scope

The redevelopment of 6 Meninya Street will prepare the site for private investment and revitalise the Meninya Street precinct. Key components of the project include:

- Demolition of existing buildings (former Council office, toilet block and detached office)
- Construction of a new Changing Places facility
- Relocation of the bus stop and site beautification
- Creation of public greenspace
- Expression of Interest (EOI) process to attract developers to purchase and develop the site (in line with E2 Commercial Centre zoning and community/economic outcomes).

Project Funding Breakdown

This project aligns with several local and regional strategies and specifically addresses the Meninya Street South Master Plan and Meninya Street Upgrade objectives. Community feedback identified the need to redevelop the Meninya Street entry gateway and 6 Meninya Street office location.

The project responds to community feedback and aligns with Council's strategic priorities for precinct activation, accessibility, and infrastructure enhancement.

Community support has been demonstrated through consultation undertaken during development of the Meninya Street South Master Plan, the broader Meninya Street Master Plan, and public engagement on concept designs and three-dimensional video animations of the streetscape.

Council also recognises the challenges facing Moulamein if water buybacks proceed and agrees investment will be essential. The forthcoming Moulamein Masterplan will help position priority projects, such as the Wharf, for future SCP funding rounds.

# **DISCUSSION**

The existing building at 6 Meninya Street has exceeded its useful life and is no longer compliant with modern accessibility standards. The site also presents safety and operational concerns, including:

- Trip hazards
- Poor lighting
- Inadequate accessibility
- Ongoing vandalism and security issues

The adjacent bus stop and car park also require upgrades to meet accessibility and safety standards. Left unaddressed, these issues will continue to pose risks to users, detract from the amenity of Moama's main entry point, and create ongoing liability for Council.

The Asset Management Plan for the 6 Meninya Street buildings states a replacement value of \$1.449 million (building only). Without the SCP grant, Council would be required to identify its own funding sources to address the building's poor condition and undertake necessary redevelopment — placing a significant financial burden on Council with no external support.

Accepting this funding ensures that:

• Council can leverage more than \$1 million in external funds to deliver a project that directly addresses asset, safety, and accessibility issues.

- The site is transformed into an investment-ready gateway precinct, catalysing further private development in line with the Meninya Street Master Plan.
- Economic activity, job creation, and community benefit are maximised at a far lower net cost to Council.

During delivery, Council will work closely with stakeholders such as the Moama RSL, Moama Market and other key event organisers to ensure the project supports community and economic outcomes.

Securing this SCP grant enables Council to address longstanding safety and accessibility issues without bearing the full replacement cost, while also unlocking more than \$1 million in external funding to revitalise the site.

The project maximises community and economic benefits at a lower net cost to Council, positions the site as an investment-ready gateway precinct, and delivers on Council's long-term strategies.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Council was successful in securing funding through Heritage NSW's 2025–27 Local Government Heritage Grant Program. A total of \$13,000 is available for allocation in FY26, comprising:

- \$6,500 from Heritage NSW
- \$6,500 matching contribution from Council

The Local Heritage Fund (LHF) supports conservation works—covering both labour and materials—for privately owned heritage items listed on Schedule 5 of Council's Local Environmental Plans (LEPs).

Funding is prioritised for projects that demonstrate:

- Sustainable, long-term heritage outcomes
- Public benefit and enjoyment
- Innovation and leadership in heritage conservation
- Capacity and commitment to complete the project
- Cost-effectiveness and equitable distribution of funds

Recent changes to Heritage NSW's funding guidelines now exclude:

- Projects involving Council-owned assets where Council is legally responsible for maintenance
- Projects not listed on Schedule 5 of Council's LEPs

These changes have narrowed the scope of eligible projects under the LHF.

#### **DISCUSSION**

The FY26 round of Council's Local Heritage Fund opened on 25 July and closed on 4 September 2025. It was promoted through Council's standard communication channels.

One application was received during this round.

Council's Development Services Panel convened on 28 August 2025 and assessed the application against the program's guidelines and criteria. The panel determined that the application was eligible and recommended that funding be awarded.

#### **RATIONALE**

Chief Executive Officer is not the formal title used in the NSW Local Government Act 1993.

In NSW, a Council might call the General Manager a 'CEO' in communications, but legally under the Act, they remain the General Manager.

CEO is not the legislative term in NSW, but some Councils Adopt it as a corporate-style title for their General Manager.

It is more commonly used in Queensland, Victoria, Western Australia under their respective Local Government frameworks.

The Local Government Act 1993 (NSW) only recognises the title of General Manager.

I commend this Notice of Motion to Council.

# OFFICER COMMENT

The current position description and current employment contract are in place for Chief Executive Officer. These would need to be altered to reflect a new title.

In addition to this, all the Murray River Council strategies, policies, procedures, delegations, contracts, leases, licences, agreements and other written documents reference the role as CEO.

Whilst these can all be changed there may be a significant transition period to make these changes as these documents are reviewed over time.

Across NSW Local Government both General Manager and CEO are used to describe the role. By way of benchmarking the following titles are used by other RAMJO Member Councils.

Economic Development and Tourism (EDT) staff have been actively supporting Barham High School's plans to establish a Multi-Purpose Centre. This support has included:

- Regular discussions with Brendan Yu [Principal] regarding the project and its development
- Sharing relevant funding opportunities as they arise
- Meeting on-site in April to hear more about the school's vision and discuss potential funding pathways
- Ongoing exploration of suitable grant opportunities in partnership with the school
- Council support ongoing includes:
- Identifying and sharing grant opportunities
- Providing letters of support
- Assisting with identifying strategic partnerships
- Reviewing and supporting grant applications
- Advocating for the project with local members and NSW Ministers and government departments when possible

The estimated project cost is over \$5 million. Given the school's limited capacity to contribute funding, it is expected that full funding will take time to secure.

# **Country University Centre (CUC)**

The Country Universities Centre (CUC) is a network of 28 community owned and operated centres across over 40 locations in regional NSW, Queensland, Victoria, Tasmania and Norfolk Island. The Centres provide equitable access to higher education for regional people without the need to leave their community.

The CUC supports any student studying any course from any university or higher education provider, which encourages a diversity of degree pathways and vibrant regional learning communities.

There are currently over 3700 + CUC students across the network who are studying over 1000 unique degrees from 40+ different Australian universities and higher education providers.



Since its creation the CUC has supported over **8,700 students**.



At the end of 2024, the CUC saw over **353 students graduate** across the network.

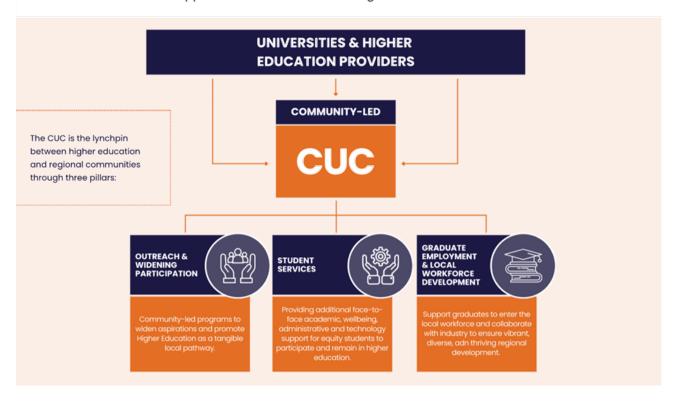


70% of students anticipate they will work for the Commonwealth, State or Local government upon graduation.



In 2023, **96% of graduates** went on to work as professionals or further study in **their local community** and have helped fill regional workforce shortages.

Each CUC provides face-to-face academic and wellbeing student services from local staff, and facilities that have quiet study spaces, breakout rooms, high-speed internet, and a local learning community. This allows students to have the physical infrastructure and personalised face-to-face local support needed to ensure their higher education success.





The CUC also facilitates community-led widening participation and outreach programs in over 100 schools in collaboration with 19 university partners. This reimagination of widening participation and outreach has received over \$5 million from the Australian Government as part of the Regional Partnerships Project Pool Program (RPPPP).

By supporting equity students to succeed, and nurturing the aspirations of the community the CUC is the lynchpin between universities and the local community.

#### **Equity**

The CUC is focused on supporting equity students within regional communities and those who have traditionally been excluded from higher education to ensure vibrant, diverse, and educated regional communities into the future.

#### Locations

Each Centre is owned and run by a local skills-based volunteer board and chooses to affiliate with the CUC network.





40% of CUC students are from Low Socioeconomic backgrounds compared to 17% nationally (NCSEHE, 2019)



77% of CUC students identify as Female



7% of CUC students identify as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander compared to 1.95% nationally (NCSEHE, 2019)



52% are the first in their family to study at university



84% are 25 years of age or older





#### **Funding arrangements**

The CUC receives funding from the State Governments, Australian Government Regional University Study Hubs program, local government, and industry. The CUC also generates additional revenue through partnerships with universities to provide further support for students. This collaborative funding model, in addition to over \$5 million of in-kind support from local volunteers and community organisations, has ensured the ongoing success and sustainability of the CUC.

#### **Evaluation**

The NSW Department of Education commissioned an independent evaluation of the impact of the CUC which has delivered a positive report and recommendations. In 2021, an independent evaluation funded by the Commonwealth Government found that the CUC was a successful and cost-effective model to widening participation higher education in regional Australia.

#### Opportunities for the Future

The Universities Accord illuminates the importance of equity in higher education and uniting vocational and higher education training. The CUC has also developed a model in collaboration with several small communities that can support TAFE and VET students in locations where a TAFE campus is not viable - significantly increasing the study and career options for local people and leveraging the existing investments into the CUC for greater impact. The CUC can ensure that no matter where you live, or what background you come from, lifelong learning through access to both university and TAFE training opportunities are available across regional Australia.

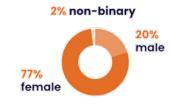
# **TOP AREAS OF STUDY**

#### 10.3 NOTICE OF MOTION - GRAVEL PITS

I, Councillor Gary Pappin, give notice that at the next Ordinary Meeting of Council to be held on 23 September 2025, I intend to move the following motion:

#### **MOTION**

That Murray River Council address and investigate the matter and lack of gravel pits within the LGA

#### **RATIONALE**

Seeking to investigate the use of locally sourced gravel for Council projects and maintenance.

I commend this Notice of Motion to Council.

## **OFFICER COMMENTS**

As per the Notice of Motion put to Council in March 2025 the following information remains relevant.

March 2025 Full Council Report is attached for Council's information.

Gravel pits are regulated by the Mining Regulator. In 2024, Council was audited by the Mining Regulator. The audit results indicated that the majority of gravel pits must be closed due to the legislated requirements that Council was unable to meet. For example, annual respirable silica monitoring is required, which is expensive and not feasible when the pit is not in operation.

A list of Council gravel pits and their status as Open or Closed is included in Attachment 1 and 2. Details are provided of the reasons for closures. The location of pits is shown in Attachment 3. Open pits are marked with a black symbol and Closed pits with a red symbol.

Most of the closed pits have not been accessed for at least 5 years, and potentially over a decade. It is challenging to comply with regulations if they remain open and are not operated regularly.

The pits located in the far west of the LGA are all calcrete pits that form in sand hills, and each one is very limited in area. The Quality of the materials is not always ideal for construction. Most of these pits were exhausted and restored over a decade ago, leaving only slight marks on the surface. In some cases, it is difficult to even locate the old pits. For example, Pit 34 shows no signs of the former pit, as confirmed by drone footage taken during Council inspections. (This and other closure inspection footage is available for viewing if required.)

Pits can be reopened if necessary, so the closures are not entirely permanent. Council's regulatory obligations are alleviated for the pits that are closed.

Council has a cash backed reserve of \$368,866 for rehabilitation of gravel pits. The current liability for the closure of all pits is \$1,229,554.

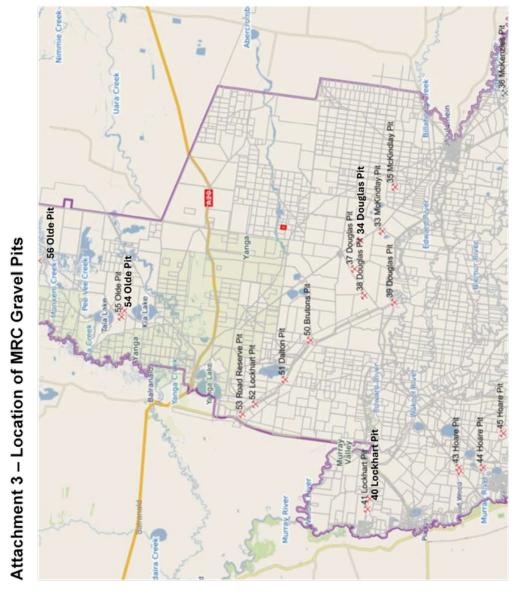

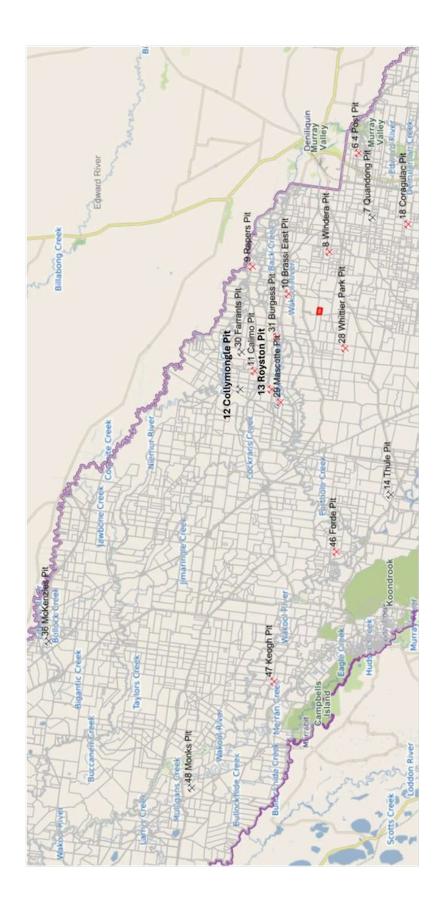

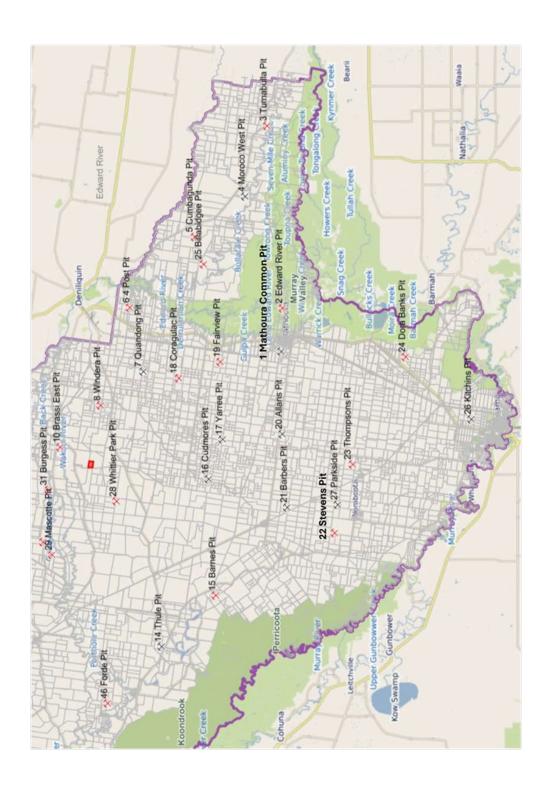

#### RECOMMENDATION

That Council receive and note the Officers Response to the following question:

1. What is the current status of Council's gravel pits, including details on any pits that have been closed or are in the process of closing, along with the reasons for their closure?

#### OFFICERS COMMENT - DIRECTOR INFRASTRUCTURE

In 2024, Council was audited by the Mining Regulator. The audit results indicated that the majority of gravel pits must be closed due to the legislated requirements that Council was unable to meet. For example, annual respirable silica monitoring is required, which is expensive and not feasible when the pit is not in operation.

A list of Council gravel pits and their status as Open or Closed is included in Attachment 1 and 2. Details are provided of the reasons for closures. The location of pits is shown in Attachment 3. Open pits are marked with a black symbol and Closed pits with a red symbol.

Most of the closed pits have not been accessed for at least 5 years, and potentially over a decade. It is challenging to comply with regulations if they remain open and are not operated regularly.

The pits located in the far west of the LGA are all calcrete pits that form in sand hills, and each one is very limited in area. Most of these pits were exhausted and restored over a decade ago, leaving only slight marks on the surface. In some cases, it is difficult to even locate the old pits. For example, Pit 34 shows no signs of the former pit, as confirmed by drone footage taken during Council inspections. (This and other closure inspection footage is available for viewing if required.)

Pits can be reopened if necessary, so the closures are not entirely permanent. Council's regulatory obligations are alleviated for the pits that are closed.

Council has a cash backed reserve of \$368,866 for rehabilitation of gravel pits. The current liability for the closure of all pits is \$1,229,554.

#### **RATIONALE**

I wish to have costing and options for Noorong Road Flood culvert following an enquiry by the Merran Creek Water Trust.

#### OFFICER COMMENT

Officers are aware of this issue raised by the Merran Creek Water Trust.

- The Merran Creek Water Trust have concerns with culvert capacity on Noorong Road in a flood event. In the 2022 flood event the road was cut to allow more water to pass through.
- Flood modelling is needed to assess the issue and also to assess the impact of proposed solutions.
- The area is outside of the Barham Flood Study that is currently underway.
- DCCEEW have a floodplain model (Murray Valley Urban Floodplain Model) that could be used for the assessment and will make this available to Council.
- Next steps are to meet with the Trust to scope the modelling and then seek a quotation from a consultant who is familiar with the floodplain model.
- Director is meeting with the Trust on 30 September at the Barham Office.
- Once we understand costs, funding options will need to be discussed

The use of consultants is sometimes necessary to bring in specialist expertise, expediate timelines, ensure external impartiality, deliver specialist training, or bring together a team of experts to assist Council to develop complex plans in line legislation or regulations.

Many operational and capital projects will include cost of consultancy as part of the overall project budget.

Procurement of consultant services in undertaken in line with the Procurement Policy and any consultancy outside of CEO delegation would require a Council resolution.
