Ongoing	<p>Job Keeper Payment Australian Government Vital support for not-for-profits</p> <p><a href="#">Guidelines</a></p> <p>The existing JobKeeper Payment will remain in place until 27 September 2020. From 28 September 2020, the JobKeeper Payment will be extended for businesses and not-for-profits that have been most significantly impacted, the payment rates will be stepped-down and two tiers of payment will be introduced.</p>	<p>NFPs (including charities) are eligible to apply for the Scheme. The JobKeeper Payment will help to offset the cost of ongoing employees and will encourage employers to maintain a connection with employees that have been stood down.</p> <p>The employer must have been in an employment relationship with eligible employees as at 1 March 2020, and confirm that each eligible employee is currently engaged to receive the JobKeeper Payment.</p> <p>NFPs (excluding charities) will be eligible for the JobKeeper Payment if, at the time of applying:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• they have an aggregated turnover of less than \$1 billion (for income tax purposes) and they estimate their GST turnover has fallen or will likely fall by 30 per cent or more; or</li> <li>• they have an aggregated turnover of \$1 billion or more (for income tax purposes) and they estimate their GST turnover has fallen or will fall by 50 per cent or more.</li> </ul> <p>Charities registered with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) will be eligible for the subsidy if they estimate their turnover has or will likely fall by 15 per cent or more relative to a comparable period. This lower turnover decline test does not apply to universities and non-government schools that are registered charities, who will remain subject to the turnover decline tests set out above for other not-for-profits.</p>
Ongoing	<p>Boosting Cash Flow for Employers Australian Government Vital support for not-for-profits</p> <p><a href="#">Guidelines</a></p>	<p>The Government is providing at least \$20,000 and up to \$100,000 to businesses and NFPs with aggregated turnover under \$50 million and that employ workers. These payments will help businesses and NFPs' cash flow so they can keep operating, pay their rent, electricity and other bills and retain staff.</p> <p>NFP employers will receive an initial payment equal to 100 percent of Pay-As-You-Go income tax withheld from their employees' salary and wages, with a minimum payment of \$10,000 and the maximum payment capped at \$50,000. An additional payment is also being introduced in the July – October 2020 period, where eligible entities will receive an additional payment equal to the total of all payments they have received. This means that eligible entities will receive at least \$20,000 and up to a total of \$100,000.</p>

		<p>NFPs with aggregated turnover under \$50 million that employ workers will be eligible. This can include companies, trusts and other eligible NFP structures.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• NFP entities who do not employ salary and wage staff but who have a Pay As-You-Go withholding obligation in relation to other forms of remuneration may also be eligible where they satisfy the other eligibility requirements;</li> <li>• The payments will only be available to eligible NFP employers established prior to 12 March 2020. However, charities registered with the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profit Commission (ACNC) will be eligible regardless of when they were registered, subject to meeting other eligibility requirements;</li> <li>• Eligibility for taxable NFPs will be determined on prior year aggregated turnover as these entities lodge income-tax returns; eligibility for income-tax-exempt NFPs registered for GST will be estimated from GST reported amounts through the BAS statement; and eligibility for registered charities will be estimated based on information derived from Annual Information Statements provided to the ACNC or GST reported through the BAS statement.</li> </ul>
Ongoing	<p>Coronavirus Small and Medium Enterprises (SME) Guarantee Scheme  Australian Government  Vital support for not-for-profits</p> <p><a href="#">Guidelines</a></p>	<p>To enhance lenders' willingness and ability to provide credit, supporting many otherwise viable SMEs, including NFPs, to access vital additional funding to get through the impact of Coronavirus. Under the Scheme, the Government will guarantee 50 per cent of new loans issued by participating lenders to SMEs.  Through this Scheme, the Government will support unsecured loans of up to \$250,000.</p> <p>NFPs are eligible for the Scheme, provided they have an aggregated turnover of less than \$50 million and have an ABN. The ability of SMEs, including NFPs, to access the loans is ultimately a decision for participating lenders. Credit assessment processes will be undertaken, however lenders are expected to look through the cycle to sensibly take into account the uncertainty of the current economic conditions.</p>

<p>GO4210</p> <p>25 September 2020</p>	<p>Advancing Pest Animal and Weed Control Solutions Australian Government</p> <p><a href="#">Guidelines</a></p>	<p>The main objective of this grant round is to research and develop innovative control solutions to improve the way established pest animals and weeds are managed.</p> <p>This grant round is aimed at research organisations, companies or consortia that fit one or more of the following descriptions: research and development corporations; primary industry and scientific organisations; cooperative research centres; state, territory or local governments; corporate Commonwealth entities; universities; or, public and private research organisations.</p> <p>Project applications must target invasive established pest animals or weed species that are not endemic to Australia or a particular part of Australia.</p> <p>The outcomes of the grant round are to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Advance a range of breakthrough control solutions that challenge traditional approaches to managing pest animals and weeds to enable better outcomes.</li> <li>• Deliver innovations that improve existing established pest animals and weeds control methods or tools, as well as improved detection and monitoring methods.</li> <li>• Further research into, and development of, new and enhanced 'farm ready' pest animals and weeds control tools to increase uptake and accessibility of these tools by farmers and land managers.</li> </ul> <p>Eligibility:</p> <p>To be eligible you must:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• have an Australian Business Number (ABN) or Australian Company Number (ACN)</li> <li>• be registered for the purposes of GST</li> <li>• have an account with an Australian financial institution</li> <li>• be an organisation with a proven research and development capacity</li> <li>• target a nationally significant invasive established pest animal or weed (see section 2.2.3 of grant guidelines document)</li> <li>• be applying for a grant within the grant limits (between \$300,000 and \$2 million (GST exclusive) and grant period</li> </ul>

- have a project that meets at least one of the grant program outcomes (see section 2.2.2 of grant guidelines document)
- source additional cash and/or in-kind contributions towards the project
- have completed all application forms and templates (see section 6 of the grant guidelines document: The assessment criteria).

To be eligible you must also be one of the following entity types:

The Australian Government has allocated a total of \$13 million (GST exclusive) over three years commencing in 2020-21 for this grant program. Grants are expected to be completed within three years from execution of the grant agreement. Some projects may be extended past this timeframe subject to any changes to the overall Pipeline Program timeframe.

Total grant limits that apply are:

- The minimum grant amount is \$300,000 (GST exclusive).
- The maximum grant amount is \$2 million (GST exclusive).

Include details of other contributions to the project including any voluntary labour and project management time as an 'in-kind' contribution (this includes hands on volunteer work, project management, administration, reporting, donations etc.).</p> <p>There is no funding limit for project applications, however, projects are assessed on their value for money, that is, what is the level of benefit from the project compared to the cost of the project.</p> <p>There are two different funding application forms to choose from when applying for funding – a simpler, less detailed form for small projects seeking less than \$10,000 of funding and another form for large projects seeking more than \$10,000 of funding.</p> <p>Application forms can be downloaded electronically online <a href="#">here</a>.</p> <p>Eligibility:</p> <p>Funding applications <b>must relate to the improvement of recreational fishing</b>. Where applicable, projects should:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• have appropriate expertise within the project team to complete the project</li> <li>• represent value for money by incorporating other contributing funding or 'in-kind' contribution by the applicant and other project partners</li> <li>• be technically sound and utilise best practice</li> <li>• link to key strategic recreational fishing objectives and plans, and</li> <li>• build on and extend the outcomes of projects and work previously funded by the Recreational Fishing Trust</li> </ul>
